A sweeping plan for the reorganization of the civic works department has been prepared by Controller Church, acting on the suggestion of the board of control. The controller last week announced that he would move for a readjustment of the methods of administering the department, and was invited to outline something constructive. He is now ready to do so.

He proposes, first of all, that a general manager or commissioner of works be appointed. This official would be the executive head and would have control over all the officials in the sub-departments.

Secondly, an engineering branch would be under the direct control of the chairman of a board of engineers, the board to be composed of the sub-heads of the following departments: Sewers, sidewalks and roadways, electrical, water, street railway and steam railway matters, bridges, island and general.

Thirdly, a works board would set in

This board would consist of the mayor, two members of the board of control and two members of the city council. 


