## LIQUOR CASES FAILED COUNCIL'S LAST SESSION

Lively Shooting Affray on West King Street-General News of a Busy City.

HAMILTON, Dec. 23.-(Special.)-The Citizens' League detectives' liquor cases were finished in the police court this afternoon. Out of eight charges laid against the hotels only, two were sustained. Samuel Goldberg and W. Hunter were found guilty of a technical breach of the License Act, but the magistrate declined to impose a fine until hearing from the department. Of the charges laid against four places for selling liquor without a license, only two convictions were secured. M. B. Lee and Tommy Lee Sing were each fined \$50. The charges against Frank Howe and Lucy Mannix were withdrawn, as well as the charge against the Terminal Hotel. William Stewart and William Lee, tony Creek, were acquitted of the

charge of stealing a watch from Robt. The internal management of the board of education met this evening and appointed Messrs. Taynter and Wilcox manual training teachers at a

salary of \$800. The city council held its final session of the year to-night. City Solicitor Waddell was instructed to oppose the Radial Railway's application for a Dominion charter. The company has got what is practically a street rallway franchise in Barton Township, which will soon be annexed to the city, and Mr. Waddell said it would be a very serious thing for the city if a street railway got a Dominion charter. Superintendent and Mrs. Rae of the House of Refuse were appointed super-intendent and matron of the new Home for Incurables and Walter Anderson and O. S. Hillman were reappointed city auditors. dered to Mayor Stewart.
