STRENGTH IN CORN RESULT OF STORM. No Prospect of Any Early Improvement in Traffic Conditions.

Chicago, Dec. 28.—Storms and cold which threatened to hinder seriously any improvement in traffic conditions on the railroads led, today, to an upturn in prices of corn. The market closed firm, 3/4 to 3/8 to 3/16 net higher, with January 1st, 2 1/2 to 1 3/4, and May 1st, 2 1/2 to 1 3/4. There were losses of 20c to 75c in provisions. It was not until after mid-day that bullish sentiment predominated regarding corn. Weakness earlier was largely due to notice that the directors of the exchange had prohibited further trading in the December option, and had fixed a settling price. As such action removed pressing necessity for immediate supplies the market was eased to a notable extent. Later, however, the attention of traders was attracted by reports that the weather was likely to be unfavorable and the likelihood that the crop movement would be per cent of normal proportions.
