FIGHT OVER ESTATE OF CHICAGO MILLIONAIRE

Court Proceedings Throw Light on History of Edward Morrison.

ADOPTED TWO GIRLS

Charge Made that Morrison Nas Their Father—Blackmail Exposed.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—How Edward W. Morrison, eccentric millionaire, whose estate is under investigation in Federal Judge Landis' court, adopted two girls of whose parentage their supposed father accused him, was told on the witness stand today by one of the girls, Margaret Burnstein Morrison, 12 years old, Jacob Burnstein, a junk dealer, had testified that his wife, on her deathbed, had confessed that the millionaire was the father of Margaret and her younger sister, Alice.

Claims Legal Adoption. Questioned by Judge Landis, Margaret said she had been legally adopted by the millionaire and had lived at the Morrison home since May 19, 1916. She was present at the adoption proceedings and testified that it was her mother's wish the two girls be adopted by Morrison, who she thought might care for them and give them an education.

Margaret will resume the stand when the case is opened Tuesday. Courtroom attaches remarked at the contrast in the appearance of the two girls. Margaret is plump, rosy-cheeked and curly-haired. Alice is slender, pale and has very dark eyes.

Morrison's estate was thrown into bankruptcy proceedings after an assignment of assets of \$1,000,000. Property of James R. Ward, an attorney, by terms of the will of Morrison's father, Edward Morrison, much of his property would revert to the city of Chicago in event he died without issue. His estate was estimated to be worth about \$1,000,000, but only a few tangible assets found were an apartment building worth about \$100,000, a collection of old coins and \$11 in cash.

LONDON, Aug. 25, 5.55 p.m.—An official statement issued this afternoon of the zeppelin raid upon the east and southeast coasts of England last night, follows: "Further reports show that five or six enemy airships raided the east and southeast coasts of England. Two or three raiders came in over the eastern coasts and dropped over 30 bombs without causing any casualties or damage. Another raider attempted to approach a seaport town, but was heavily fired on by anti-aircraft guns was driven off to the eastward after dropping 19 bombs into the sea without reaching their objective."

FIRE VICTIMS' BODIES PASSED THRU TORONTO

Father and One Son Accompanied Remains of Mrs. McKenzie and Six Children.

Tragedy could be felt in the very atmosphere of the Union Station yesterday, when the bodies of six children were carried in a motor car from one train to another in the lower train shed. The bodies of the bereaved father, with his hands swathed in bandages, in one coffin were the bodies of the mother and two children, and two other coffins each contained two of the children. They were all victims of the deplorable bombing of the city of London on Thursday night by German airships, an official statement issued by the war office today says.

The statement reads: "Thursday night several naval dirigibles attacked the southern portion of the English east coast, and the city of London was bombed. Batteries of the Royal Air Force and the Royal Naval Air Force were alerted, and the results were very good effects were observed. "All the airships, both going and returning, were heavily but successfully shelled by numerous guarding forces. During their attack they were fired on by anti-aircraft batteries. All have returned."
