FOR RESTRICTION OF IMMIGRATION

U. S. Senate Committee Reports Bill to Keep Out Aliens for 15 Months.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Restrictions on immigration, said by committee members to be more drastic than those proposed in the house or Johnson bill are contained in an emergency measare contained in an emergency measure approved and reported today by the senate immigration committee. The measure, decided on as a substitute for the bill passed several weeks ago by the house, would become effective next April 1 and continue in


force only until June 30, 1922.

During the fifteen months the bill's restrictions would be effective senate leaders are confident permanent immigration legislation will be enacted, and in the meantime the predicted field of allegs would be storned. flood of aliens would be stopped.

The bill, as reported by the senate committee, would limit the immigrants admitted to the United States annually admitted to the United States annually from any one country to five per cent. of the nationals of that country in the United States at the time the 1910 census was taken. The measure, however, specifically provides that it shall "not be construed as amending, repealing or modifying any law or agreement now existing which forbids the admission of any alien of any nationality or geographical boundary." This provision was interpreted to mean that treaties now existing between the United States and China and the United States and Japan would not in any wise be affected.
