"The acuon commenced at 4 o'clock in the morning with the explosion of a mine, which almost destroyed the trench. Our men charged. Ten sol-diers jumped into one section of the trench left intact, and put to flight the defenders at the point of the bayonet and with hand grenades, or made them prisoners, while others finished the destruction of the trench and prevented communication with the seco

A detective had been sent to the Nerlich home, Dunbar road, to detain Mrs. Nerlich until the warrant could be served upon her, and within an hour after the warrants were issued both Emil and Hedwig Nerlich appeared before his lordship. Chief Justice Mulock and were released on bail of \$150,000, a call of \$50,000 each and two sureties, \$40,000 by Henry Nerlich, a brother of Emil, and \$16,000 by Hugh Blain. Emil Nerlich had previously been released on \$100,000 ball.
