Tigers Play Athletics to Seventeen Inning Draw.



PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 5.—In this baseball wild town there arose a human tidal wave embracing thousands upon thousands of pennant mad rosters, when descending upon the battlefield where the Athletics and Detroit were booked to meet face to face for the last time in a double engagement for championship honors, inundated grand stand and bleachers

and encroached upon the outfield and then swept over the neighboring house-tops. Never before in the history of the national game has so great and remarkable a gathering of the enthusiastic followers been seen anywhere. The twenty-five thousand persons present marked the top notch of interest in the American pastime, and they saw one of the most

remarkable games in history, for seventeen innings were played, and darkness ended the contest with the score 9 to 9. It was a soul stirring game, into which was crowded pretty nearly everything, including a rumpus on the field in the fourth, in which all the players took part and in which many of the spectators lost a helping hand until the police "shoo'd" them back of the ropes.

TIGERS REACH TO PENNANT

Nothing Stands Between Them and the "Streamers" Now.

When the Philadelphia Athletics dropped their first game with Washington yesterday they lost all chances of winning the American League pennant, and in the dim distance the championship of the world. The Detroit Tigers are sure winners, and the Chicago Cubs, who have made a run away race of the National League, are just waiting to get a check at Hughey Jennings' collection of stars.

When the season started, Jennings said that Detroit would win the championship, and throughout the campaign, even when it seemed as if the Tigers were about to be shored out of the race by the Athletics and the White Sox, he has stuck to his original claim. "Persistence, sticking everlastingly to our task, practically excludes in a nutshell how we have forced our way to the front," was Jennings' first volley in answer to the query as to how his team got there.

"With determination, a man, an army or a base ball team can accomplish any practical task, provided it has the ability, and no man will deny that our team has had the ability."

"When I was put in charge of the Tigers this year my only task was to lead the team around to a realization of its full strength, and arouse in it a determination to win the pennant."

"After our team developed its full speed we kept pace with the champions of the world, and with the pennant race became a case of 'Pike's peak or bust'."

"We have had a well-balanced team, with the nerve, grit and aggressiveness necessary to accomplish what we set out to do."

KEIR HARDIE, M.P. TELLS OF CANADA

Writing to London Labor Leader He Says He Found in Canada Much Feeling Against Englishmen.

Montreal, Oct. 4.—The Star's London correspondent cables: Keir Hardie, M.P., writes in today's Labor Leader about his Canadian visit. He says his Canadian welcome was embarrassing in its warmth, and adds, "I fear I gave but a poor return for all the Canadian care for my well being, and succeeded in vexing, if not offending, not a few good friends, but under the circumstances I could do no other. They will, I am sure, accept this apology and explanation."

He admits his visit was too hurried to dogmatize, but one fact surprised and startled him. This was that the English



immigrants, especially the Londoners, are not popular in Canada. Professor Mavor has an advertisement from a local paper asking for workmen, stipulating that "No English need apply."

Scotchmen, Welshmen, Irishmen and Scandinavians are favorites in the order named "London lords of the universe" are barred largely because of the inveterate habit of grumbling and unwillingness to adapt themselves to new conditions. THE SITUATION IN SPRINGHILL MINES

Nova Scotia Government Will Hold a Conference With Striking Miners on Monday.

Springhill, N. S., Oct. 4.—The interesting development at Springhill today was the announcement that Deputy Inspector of Mines Cameron, who represents the government in that district, had been requested by Premier Murray to inform Pioneer Lodge that the premier and other members of the government would be in Springhill on Monday afternoon and that they desired to have a conference with the men on that occasion.

W. L. MacKenzie King had arranged to leave Springhill for Montreal this evening, but was compelled to alter this plan in consequence of a slight indisposition. He was seen by a doctor and advised to keep to his room for the night at least.

The officials are still at work keeping the pumps, engines and furnaces going. Last evening Pioneer Lodge adjourned its meeting to hear the deputy minister of labor when he spoke for over an hour, including in his remarks references to the industrial disputes act. He explained the purpose of the act and the manner in which it should be administered. He explained his mission to Nova Scotia and the result of his correspondence with J. R. Cowan.

The C. P. R. authorities are not inclined to accept the schedule of winter port rates recommended to the council at the meeting of the treasury board Thursday evening. William Downie, general superintendent, speaking of the matter yesterday said the company's feeling was that the rates should remain the same as last year as regards general freight and cattle. The proposal to increase the rate on the forerunner from 5 to 10 cents a ton, and on cattle from 2 to 3 cents, would be a serious handicap.

GOVERNMENT ASKS FOR A PROPOSAL

Black Sod Promoters Asked to Make a Bid for All Red Line Service.

Montreal, Oct. 4.—The Star's London cable says: Acting on the invitation of the British government Sir Thomas Trower, bridge and the other promoters of the Halifax-Blackod mail project, are submitting proposals for a fast through service to Australia and New Zealand via Canada. The proposal includes three twenty-five knot boats on the Atlantic crossing to Halifax from Ireland in four days, for the joint British and Canadian subsidies amounting to about \$1,750,000 against \$2,500,000 required by the projected independent syndicate, with which the names of Lord Strathcona and Hon. Clifford Sifton are associated.

The Australian connections of the Blackod-Halifax scheme will be formed by an association with the Union Steamship Company which formerly held the mail contract on the San Francisco-Australian route, and are now prepared to build twenty knot boats for the service to Australia from Vancouver, transferring to Vancouver their San Francisco business connection.

These proposals are the outcome of the expression of opinions of some members of the British government that the heavy British subsidy asked for the "All-Red" scheme would hardly be justified unless thoroughly connecting all the British links with Australia and also provided that it meet the needs and earn the subsidies from the commonwealth and New Zealand governments.

Sir James Mills, chairman of the Union Steamship Co., is now proceeding to the Antipodes to interview both governments.

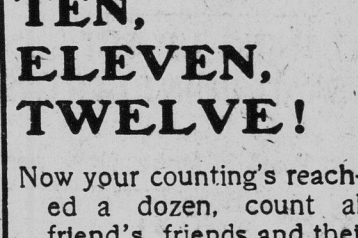
