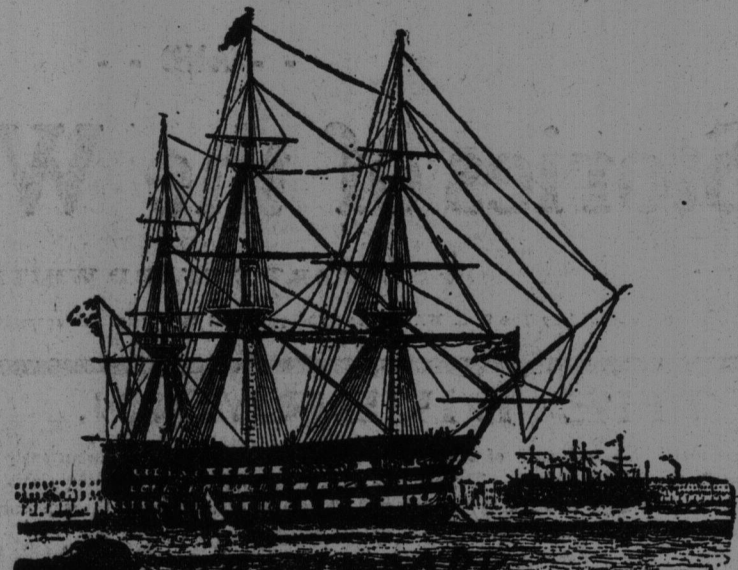

THE BODY RECOVERED

Body of John E. Brown, of Fredericton, was Found in Winnipeg River Yesterday.

KEENORA, Ont., Oct. 21 (Special).--The body of John E. Brown of Fredericton (N.B.), one of the Transcontinental survey party who was drowned at Sable Point on the Winnipeg river here on October 13, was recovered yesterday afternoon two hundred feet from shore in 120 feet of water. Brown had arrived from Fredericton only some ten days before the accident.

PULPWOOD IS NOW DUTY FREE

Burlington, Vt., Oct. 20--A decision sustaining the finding of the board of general appraisers of New York that there should be no assessment on roamed pulpwood, brought into the United States from Canada, was handed down today by Judge H. S. Wheeler, of the United States district court.

OTTAWA, Oct. 20 (Special).--In the exchequer court today E. L. Newcomb, K. C., deputy minister of justice, moved for an order dismissing the petition of right in the case of the Atlantic and Lake Superior Company vs. the King. In this case the applicants sued the crown for \$1,500,000 for an alleged breach of contract to guarantee the interest coupons upon certain bonds issued by the applicant company at the time the company alleged that by reason of such failure to guarantee it met with a loss on the English market of ten per cent on the sale of their bonds in the year 1902. The crown defends the action, denying the agreement entirely.
