HITS UPON PLAN TO INCREASE ARMY. War Secretary Haldane Will Use "Vets" as Reserve Force. London, July 7.—A "veteran's reserve force," embracing 200,000 men between the ages of 35 and 65, all of whom have seen military service, is the latest plan of the War Office for the next six months. The idea of the reserve force originated with Sir John French, a magazine editor, and was immediately adopted by Haldane. To test the temper of the people on the proposition, an appeal was issued to the County of Surrey for all "physically fit" men between the mentioned ages, who had seen service in the military, or territorial, or auxiliary, to communicate with the War Office. From this small county there were 2,800 responses. These were immediately brought together and an inspection of them made. He says there are scarcely a dozen out of the 2,800 who do not measure up to military requirements. Other counties are as enthusiastic as Surrey and just as soon as Parliament meets the necessary appropriation to pay for the work of limiting the "reserve force" will be a reality.
