SOME LOSSES AS MARKET OPENS

Considerable irregularity developed As Wall Street Day Starts  
Pressure on Recent Weak Stocks—Papers Active at Opening in Montreal  
NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—(Opening)—Considerable irregularity in prices developed at the opening of today's stock market. Selling pressure was resumed against recent weak spots. Foundation Company and Radio Corporation each showed initial losses of 14 points. Devoe and Reynolds, which broke over 10 points in two days, rallied 2 1/2, and American Brake Shoe, Hudson Motors, and Savage Arms opened one to two points higher.



OPPORTUNITY OF MASON'S GREAT

War Has Left Much To Be Done For World  
Canon Shatford Delivers Striking Address at Gathering of 400 of Fraternity

Canon Alan P. Shatford, M. A., D. C. L., O. B. E., of Montreal, past grand master of the Grand Lodge of Quebec, addressed more than 400 of the Masonic fraternity at a banquet in the Admiral Beatty Hotel last evening. Rev. C. Gordon Lawrence, rector of Trinity church, also spoke. Grand Master George D. Ellis presided. Canon Shatford said that in the upper provinces of Canada it was usual to speak of coming down to the Maritime Provinces. He said that he had discovered that the correct way of speaking was to say that one came up to these provinces, for he had found no vigor during his brief stay by the sea.

WAR GAVE LESSON  
The great war, the speaker went on, had presented the world and the Masonic craft with a problem of difficulty and also unprecedented opportunity. Since the conclusion of hostilities, a great effort had been made to bring about peace. The Locarno pact was the most illustrious effort that had yet been given birth to this evening. The Masonic fraternity was old, so old that its origin was shrouded in the mist of immemorial antiquity. What was its attitude to the world's problems? Had it any solution to offer? There was no institution in the world the application of whose principles would make more sure for world peace and brotherhood, he declared. If its principles were put into effect men would beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks and men would learn war no more.

WHAT CRAFT RECOGNIZES.  
The craft recognized the inherent dignity and honored him primarily, not because of race, color, or creed, but because he was a man. There could be no other basis of lasting peace than this free test should be not what is your creed but what is your need he said.  
There must be a fundamental belief in the divinity of God and the immortality of man, and hostility would not exist until such a belief was brought to recognize that basic principle. Light and truth were the things of the past. The rest should be retained and the bad eliminated. There must be no independence, but interdependence of people with people. Tolerance, as distinguished from mere toleration, was a necessary part of the foundation of peace and the establishment of peace.

PREMIER BAXTER.  
Hon. Dr. Baxter congratulated the craft on its splendid gathering and said that it was merely representative of the thousands of brethren to be found in the Maritime provinces. The spirit of the order was found not in its sublimity so much as in its simplicity. It was the fact that for each brother to make his life of the world a little better than he found it. The principles of Masonry could be well applied to every phase of human endeavor and of political life, used in its broadest significance.

FRANKS SPEAKER.  
Rev. Mr. Lawrence paid a high tribute to the speaker of the evening, praising his eloquence and reminding the audience that his King had seen fit to honor his services overseas with the Order of the British Empire.

DOCTOR BEQUEATHS BODY TO CAMBRIDGE  
Expresses Belief in After Life and Resurrection of the Dead  
LONDON, Feb. 16.—The Cambridge University Research Hospital, \$5,000 and my body."  
This remarkable bequest is made in the will of Sir Robert C. Brown, of Preston, consulting medical officer to the Preston Royal Infirmary, who died last November, aged eighty-nine, and left a fortune of \$40,000.  
He gave authority to the research hospital to use "such parts of my body as they may consider to be suitable additions to their pathological museum," and requested them to "place in the museum a glass bottle containing the ashes left by the cremation of my remains, with a statement of the weight of the ashes." He adds:  
"I believe in the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come, and I believe that when my body dies my soul will go to heaven, where I shall be allowed to see the forms of those pleasures which I have enjoyed on earth."

WREATH FROM BOY WHOM HE HAD SAVED  
Touching Tribute at Funeral of Frank Gibson, C. N. R. Engineer  
A large number of citizens representing all walks of life paid a last tribute of respect to the late Mr. Frank Gibson, veteran C. N. R. locomotive engineer, Montreal, whose funeral took place last Saturday afternoon. The service at the family residence, 111 Cameron street, was held at 2:30 p.m., with Rev. J. A. Ramsay, minister of St. John's United Church, officiating. He spoke feelingly of the sudden passing of Mr. Gibson.  
The choir of St. John's church sang very sympathetically the hymns, "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," "The Sands of Time Are Sinking," and "Abide With Me."  
Following the service at the house the funeral cortege, headed by the C. of P. and B. of L. E., together with sister organizations, wended its way to Elmwood cemetery, where both orders officiated at the committal service.

Among those from out-of-town present at the obsequies were deceased's daughter, Mrs. Burnett, of Providence, R. I., also his two sons, Blair and Wallace of Montreal. Others in attendance were Mrs. William Seely and Mrs. Theodore Stackhouse, of Saint John, sister-in-law and P. A. MacDonald, of Campbellton, brother-in-law. The body was laid to rest in Elmwood cemetery, the fraternal orders conducting their ritual at the graveside.
