

EXPECT BOWLING TOURNAMENT TO BE BEST EVER STAGED

MUCH INTEREST IS DISPLAYED IN BIG MEET

Plans Being Made To Entertain Visitors—Teams Now Entered

Plans are rapidly rounding into shape for the Maine and New Brunswick bowling tournament which will be held here on April 20, 21 and 22, on the Y. M. C. I. alleys. Much interest is being shown by the local bowlers, as well as by those in the various towns which intend sending teams to compete for the silver pin trophy. At a meeting of the Y. M. C. I. bowling executive held yesterday Frank Quinn, one of the members of the executive, said that indications pointed to the coming tournament being one of the best ever staged in Saint John or elsewhere for the Brunswick-Balle trophy.

The bowling executive in charge of the tournament is planning to put in seating accommodation on both sides of the field of play, as well as at the rear, thus giving the fans a better opportunity to witness the matches.

The institute is making every effort to uphold its reputation for conducting sporting events on a high plane and already preparations are underway for the entertainment of the visitors. The matches probably will be concluded on the afternoon of the last day of the tournament, and that evening it is planned to hold a smoker and special entertainment for those participating in the series.

There will be teams from Calais, Eastport, St. Stephen, Fredericton, Moncton, Halifax and two from Saint John taking part in the play, and it is expected two additional outside teams will be entered.

FIRPO'S SHOWING A DISAPPOINTMENT

Outpointed Spalla But Fails to Show Former Driving Power and Skill

BUENOS AIRES, April 4.—Luis Firpo proved a disappointment to his followers here last night in a 12-round bout with Erminio Spalla, the Italian heavy weight champion.

The Argentine champion won on points, but failed to display anything like his former power. He showed much clinching throughout the fight, and Spalla, who was 35 pounds lighter than Firpo, fought gamely to show streaks of aggressiveness that might have spelled disaster for the South American had not the bell given him timely grace.

Only in the sixth and eighth rounds was there any outstanding action. In the sixth Firpo landed heavily to the body and head and had his opponent groggy. Spalla, however, showed will to withstand the rain of blows, but for a few seconds it seemed as though he would not weather the storm.

In the eighth he landed on Firpo's jaw and with some hard swings and straight punches sent Firpo to the ropes. Firpo appeared dazed and took a lot of punishment before the bell.

Below is a silver ribbon plate bearing the donor's name. On each side of the shield are four smaller shields for the winners' names. Members of the league feel very grateful to Mr. Terry for his generosity and have assured him that there will be some keen competition for the trophy this season.

CHIEF PLAYERS MAKE TWO NEW RECORDS IN 18.1 BILLIARD

NEW YORK, April 4.—Willie Hoppe, billiard champion for almost two decades, relinquished the last of his titles last night to Jake Schaefer, of Chicago, by losing the final block of a 3,000-point match for the world's 18.1 ball line crown 300 to 230. The final score read: Schaefer, 3,000; Hoppe, 2,300.

Hoppe entered the twelfth and final block facing an almost insurmountable handicap of 604 points. He made a brilliant stand in the seventh inning, running 144, but Schaefer closed with a spectacular start, clicking off 74, 10 and 21 to win the championship. The victory marked a brilliant comeback for Schaefer, who only recently lost to Eric Hagengraber, of Germany, the 18.2 ball line title he had wrested from Hoppe a year ago.

The Chicago player established two new records to add to the string he already holds in the 18.2 ball line game. He finished with a new high average mark for the match of 34, 22, 106, against Hoppe's 28, 42, 108, while he established a record run of 241 on Thursday.
