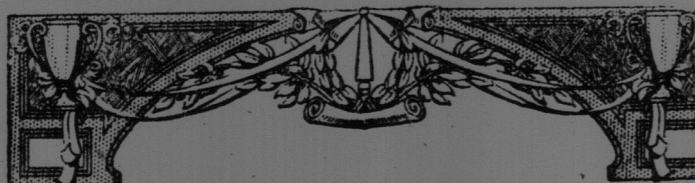

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GOOD SUPPLY AT THE CITY MARKET. A few strawberries were on sale at 25 cents per box.

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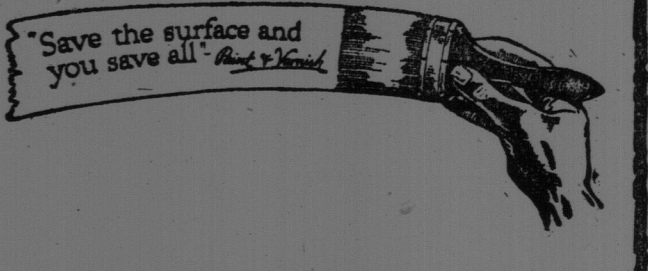
