The dentist who is certified as knowing his way about other peoples' mouths is henceforth to be known as a "Dental Surgeon," and is entitled to place the letters "L. D. S." (Licentiate of Dental Surgery) after his name. The unqualified man must remain just a plain "dentist."

This is the result of the dentist's act, which was passed in 1921 and which provides that no one may practice as a dentist until he has been properly registered. There is nothing to prevent an unqualified dentiat from registering, but the public is protected by the differentiation with regard to titles.
