Y.M.C.I. PLAYERS SCORE BIG HIT

"Fine Feathers," a Wonderful Production, Well-performed and Finely Staged—Repeated Tonight and Tomorrow.

In a play marked by intense dramatic situations backed by scenic effects that have seldom been seen on an amateur stage, the Y. M. C. I. Dramatic Club scored a distinct hit in their production of "Fine Feathers," a four act drama by Eugene Walters, in St. Vincent's Auditorium last evening. The production was characterized by its heavy acting and then again calling for quick changes to more light-lined local amateurs gave a finished performance. Careful attention was given to details and the theme of the story was worked out in a manner that kept the audience keyed up from the rise until the fall of the curtain. John R. McCloskey, under whose direction the play was produced, has reason to feel proud of the success attained. He assembled a cast that knew its part and seemed to feel their parting roles and after all, it is the feeling that an actor or actress puts into his or her part, that counts. This was the plot and the play is one that keeps the audience guessing. Mrs. Goddard played an exacting role in an excellent manner, probably making it one of her best efforts to date which is saying a good deal, in view of her past splendid record. D. J. Corr, who has already an enviable record on the local stage, gave one of the finest demonstrations as a master of dramatics that has been seen here for some time, whether amateur or professional.

Mr. Corr as the man who first tried to avoid the inevitable but later yielding through his wife's influence, gave a finished and high class performance. His great change came in the third act and when he makes a clean breast of how "he is sick of the whole business" he scored distinctly.

John U. Hagerly, as the Business Man, gave his usual polished performance. His scenes with Mr. Corr and Mrs. Goddard gave him some great opportunities and he lived up to his former reputation in amateur theatricals as a "smooth villain."

John D. McGuire, as Dick Meade, probably had the snappiest role in the piece. His character called for considerable versatility but the change fitted in and he did not spoil his chances. The first two acts finds him a jolly good natured reporter, always just "feeling good," but the last two acts, in which he tries to save the Reynolds home from ruin, he plays a strong part which found much favor with the audience. He showed he could produce the more serious lines just as well as his comedy delineations and in this he showed himself a clever actor.

ENGLISH LAW STOPS QUACKERY

London, Jan. 9.—From today the man who develops a toothache in England will be able to tell by a mere glance at the "shingle" of the nearest dentist whether the latter is a fully qualified practitioner or whether the aching molar must be nursed along by the dentist in the next street. The dentist who is certified as knowing his way about other people's mouths is henceforth to be known as a "Dental Surgeon," and is entitled to place the letters "D. S." (Licentiate of Dental Surgery) after his name. The unqualified man must remain just a plain "dentist."

This is the result of the dentists' act, which was passed in 1921 and which provides that no one may practice as a dentist until he has been properly registered. There is nothing to prevent an unqualified dentist from practicing, but the public is protected by the differentiation with regard to titles.
