Novel Skin Treatment For The Winter Girl

In those days when one has been out in the cold for a long time and one's skin feels as if it were going to crack in a thousand places, it is a wise idea to don a face mask upon returning home.


Before shrouding your face in this cotton covering, smear the cuticle over with some healing cream and allow it to remain on for at least five minutes, wiping it off then with a ball of absorbent cotton. This is the best and simplest way of getting the dust and powder off the skin and out of the pores.

You next cover your face with a thick coat of the following cream which is a great favorite in New England where chapped skins are not a rare occurrence. This cream is made by mixing together in the usual way fifteen ounces of cottonseed oil, three and one-half ounces of spermaceti, three and one-half ounces of white wax, twelve drops of oil of lavender flowers and seven and three-quarter ounces of rose-water.

What next? Why, you must immediately don a face mask—which is made of heavy cotton cloth with holes cut for the eyes, nose and mouth. It is also equipped with strings which fasten at the back of the head.

My beauty patient must now resign herself to sitting quietly with a book or bit of sewing in her hands until full of sixty minutes have flown by.

When it is time to remove the mask hasten to the bathroom and wash off the soothing cream with floods of hot, soapy water. As soon as you think your face is freed from the cream, attach a bath spray to the cold water faucet and deluge your face with the icy water. If you are not a cold water fan you will doubtless view this part of your beauty task with disfavor but do not omit it, I beg of you, as it is essential that the legs

BROWN SUGAR CORNSTARCH PUDDING

Three cups boiling water, 3 large tablespoons cornstarch, 5 tablespoons brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg. Mix dry ingredients together thoroughly, moisten with a little cold water, then beat in egg. Pour all into the hot water, stirring until thick and smooth. Cook slowly about 15 minutes. Serve hot or cold.

CINNAMON BREAD PUDDING

One egg, 2/3 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 scant teaspoon salt, 2 cups bread crumbs, 1/2 cup raisins, 1 scant quart milk. Beat egg a little, then add other ingredients. Cook in double boiler about one hour. Serve with cream (whipped or plain) and sugar, or any other favorite pudding sauce.

CRUMB GRIDDLE CAKES

Solid 1 pint milk, pour it over 1 1/2 cups bread crumbs and 1 tablespoon of butter and let stand until cool. Add 1 cup flour, pinch of salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder, and 2 egg yolks, and beat the stiffly beaten whites of 2 eggs. Fry on hot griddle.

GIRL UNCONSCIOUS FOR FIVE MONTHS; HAD STUDIED TOO HARD

Has Regained Senses Several Times But Only For a Few Minutes

Spokane, Wash., March 13—As a result of overstudy in preparing for a high school examination, 17-year-old Irene Burns, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Burns, of Spokane, has been unconscious for five months, with the exception of a half a dozen intervals when she regained consciousness only for a few minutes. On October 3 the girl was stricken with what was pronounced hysterical-cataplexy. Her muscles became rigid, jaws set, and while her eyes were wide open, to all appearances she was unable to recognize anybody. During her last period of consciousness she told physicians that she had what had been going on about her during the last five months.

Recently an operation was performed for the removal of an unnatural growth near the abdomen, and there is now hope for her recovery. The school examinations which are blamed for her condition, occurred on August 15 and 16, last year. On August 18 the girl first became hysterical.






