COULON AND HAYES IN A FAKE FIGHT

New Haven, Conn., June 12.—Johnny Coulon of Chicago, bantam weight champion, last night figured in a fight with Frankie Hayes of St. Louis, which fans looked upon as a fake. The bout was scheduled to go ten rounds, but at the end of the third, Referee Fitzgerald left the ring, refusing to officiate in what he said was a "frame-up." He declared that the boys had been taking from the start and that they had refused to fight after he had warned them. Chief of police Cowles ordered the fight to go on, and Announcer Doherty acted as referee. The boys went at it again, but before they had been fighting a minute in the fourth round, Hayes went to the floor. He remained down till the count of eight, but after a couple of seconds went down again, this time being counted out. The fighters were roundly hissed as they left the ring.

Cross the Ocean in a Motor Boat: The latest project of Thomas Fleming Day, of New York, editor of the Rudder, and most venturesome yachtsman, is to attempt a voyage across the Atlantic ocean in a 35-foot motor boat. He sailed last year from Providence, R.I., to Rome in the tiny yawl Seabird, but save for the test of seamanship, this was not such a feat as the proposed motorboat trip, for the Atlantic had been crossed in small sailing craft before. Mr. Day expects to start either from Boston or New York during the last part of this month to traverse the waters in which a motorboat has never left a track. Queenstown, Ireland, is the port of destination selected by Mr. Day, and the voyage will be doubly hazardous because the route will take along the steamship lane and the motorboat will be but a speck on the waves of the Atlantic. The boat selected for the trip is the Detroit, built by the Mathew's Boat Co. of Port Clinton, Ohio, and owned by W. E. Scripps of the Detroit Motor Boat Club. Although but 35 feet long, the Detroit is of unusually heavy construction with a tank capacity for 1,000 gallons of gasoline. It will run on the Detroit steadily for 25 days. Her speed is about six nautical miles an hour, and she has a fuel tank of 160 miles. Mr. Day figures will cover in ocean traveling an average of 160 miles a day, so he gives himself very little margin for emergencies. The Detroit is 32 feet 2 inches on the water line, 8 feet beam, 4 feet 7 inches draft when loaded, 5 feet 9 inches freeboard at the bow, and only 2 feet 6 inches in the water. Her freeboard at the stern is 4 feet. For ballast she carries an iron weight of 1,000 pounds and her total displacement is 25,000 pounds. She is equipped with a 25-horse power and an emergency set of sails and is divided into three compartments separated by watertight bulkheads. There are accommodations on the Detroit for a crew of five men, two in the engine room and three on deck. The motor is from 10 to 12 horse power and the engine room crew will stand six-hour watches. The deck crew will have watches of four hours on and eight hours off. Provisions for 90 days and 200 gallons of fresh water will be carried. Mr. Day will carry the only matches on the boat and deal them out with due care. No smoking will be allowed. This voyage, but it is necessary to avoid chances of accident. There is a cabin forward for the crew, eight feet six inches long and with six feet head room. The stove is in the fore part of the cabin and the engine is aft. Mr. Day expects to keep in satisfactory communication with New York by passing steamships. In his voyage in the Seabird last year he was out of range of communication for many days and after leaving the lower coast on a charge of manslaughter, he was relieved to hear of his arrival at Gibraltar.

APPEAL SENT SPECTATORS FROM GROUNDS

New York, June 11.—An appeal to the umpire for protection from the abuse of a spectator, this being the first time that a big league player has taken advantage of the rule permitting this since the memory of Ty Cobb incident a few weeks ago, was made yesterday by a player of the Brooklyn team during the game between the Brooklyn Nationals and the Pittsburgh Pirates. Smith, Brooklyn's third baseman, was the protesting player. The incident occurred during the fifth inning when Smith complained to Umpire Owens of what he claimed was abusive language being used by a spectator in one of the boxes. Before Owens had a chance to appeal to the manager the spectator pointed out by Smith left the grand stand. Twenty-nine men, including a woman, accompanied him. They had been occupying two boxes assigned to a Brooklyn fraternal organization.

Cambridge Autoist Fined \$200 for Killing a Man: Boston, June 11.—Edwin M. Chamberlain, a Cambridge automobilist, who was indicted by the Middlesex grand jury on a charge of leaving an injured person in the road, yesterday pleaded guilty in the superior court at East Cambridge and paid a fine of \$200. In the evening of March 10 the defendant, who was driving a runabout, ran into and injured Peter Wormley at the corner of Broadway and Townbridge streets, Cambridge. Wormley died a few hours after the accident, and Chamberlain, who gave himself up to the police, was held in the lower court on a charge of manslaughter. The grand jury, however, reduced the charge.
