He is to leave Windsor on Monday for Boston and his friends and supporters are be-ing asked to subscribe a sufficient sum to meet his legitimate expenses. In 1922 Victor was a competitor in the Boston Marathon, and his showing on that occasion was indeed credible, seventy-eight of the world's best long distance runners faced the starter, and as the runners completed the twenty-six miles, 385 yards, the Windsor wonder carried the freshest smile. He finished in fourth position in the fine time of 2.24.02, and the winner eclipsed all previous records. 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
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
