SEES TAX ON GAS.

MONTREAL, March 25. — "Unless there is some drawback provision for us, it will mean another tax on the gas consumers of Montreal," J. S. Norris, vice-president and general manager of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company, said last night of the budget provision raising from 14 to 50 cents a ton the duty on American slack coal.




