

DEDICATION, CONFIRMATION BY BISHOP HERE

Organ Chimes Are Played Following Ceremony in Trinity
ANNIVERSARY OF SALVATION ARMY
Special Events in Some of City Churches on Sunday.

A congregation greater than the seating capacity of the church attended the deeply impressive service in Trinity church yesterday morning when His Lordship Bishop Richardson administered the sacrament of confirmation to a class of 40 presented by the Rev. C. Gordon Lawrence, and officiated at the solemn dedication of the organ chimes presented by G. P. S. S. Coupe in memory of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Coupe.

A handsome brass memorial tablet giving the history of the organ was also unveiled at the service. Rev. C. J. Markham assisted the rector and the full choir of the church rendered appropriate music. James S. Ford was at the organ and after the dedication of the chimes he played a short organ selection demonstrating their beauty of tone.

The inscription of the tablet which gives the organ history is as follows: "To the glory of God and in grateful memory of Charles Merrill, a worthy man of this church, died Feb. 27, 1918. Erected Jan. 22, 1925. Rebuilt and enlarged 1925. The organ chimes in memory of Robert Edward Coupe, Nov. 23, 1921; also his wife, Sara Elizabeth Wood, July 10, 1916. The gift of their sons."

His Lordship Bishop Richardson spent yesterday in the city and will remain here until Wednesday. Last night he was the preacher at Trinity church and delivered a most appropriate Holy Week message. Rev. C. J. Markham will administer the sacrament of confirmation at St. Mary's church and tomorrow evening at St. John (Stone) church.

SALVATION ARMY.
Large congregations attended the 40th anniversary exercises of the Salvation Army, held yesterday. The anniversary exercises began at 2 p.m. with an open-air meeting in King square. Yesterday morning an open-air service was held on Broadview avenue. At the afternoon meeting yesterday in the Citadel Commandant Bullock referred to the early days of the Army here and of visits of William Booth to his father's home. Commandant Parsons of Moncton spoke on "Human Derelicts."

An open-air meeting was held in King street in the evening and a sacred service in the Citadel in Charlotte street afterwards, when Commandant Parsons gave the address and spoke on "Indifference." Tonight there will be a great international demonstration, when 35 to 40 will take part in the pageant presenting the work of the Army in every land.

PUBLIC MEETING.
A public meeting in the Citadel in the afternoon was presided over by His Worship Mayor Potts, and attended by many leading public men, including Commissioners Bullock and Wigmore, and L. P. D. Tilley, who were seated on the platform. Rev. George Oran offered the opening prayer. Adjutant Davis read messages of greetings from former Saint John officers and from the Army leaders. Amongst those who sent greetings were Staff Captain Nellie Banks, who is now Mrs. Alby; Lieut-Col. Kimball, in New York, who was one of the first Salvation Army converts in Saint John; Colonel and Mrs. Jacobs, now in Toronto; Commissioner Sowton, head of the Army in Canada; Colonel Powley, Colonel Gideon Miller, Major Kendall, who was in charge when the Salvation Army hall was in the bowling alley near St. Malach's hall, which had been provided by John Bullock, and was the Army headquarters here for seven years; Mrs. John Wolfe, who was formerly Miss Ada McCarthy, an outstanding convert who is now in Montreal; J. Wonnacot, Winnipeg, and Lieut-Col. T. Coates, Y. E.

During the meeting a telegram of greeting was received from Esnaig Paton, in St. John's Nfld.

A duet, "In Jesus" was sung by Spaldin Thompson and Commandant Sparks, and Mrs. Commandant Parsons sang "The Bird with the Broken Wing."

MISSION SUPERINTENDENT.
Rev. J. W. McConnell, D.D., superintendent of missions for the Methodist church in Eastern Canada, was the preacher at the evening service in the United church in East Saint John. He was in the city on his way from Toronto to Halifax. He goes to Fredericton today. Dr. McConnell commented the East Saint John congregation on the success it had attained and spoke of the matter of Church Union. He believed the world's need would be supplied through union.

Very large congregations were present at the services in the Main street Baptist church yesterday when Rev. Dr. David Hutchinson gave forceful addresses. In the morning eight were baptised and in the evening eleven were received into membership. The attendance at the communion service in the evening was one of the largest in years. It was the last communion service at which Dr. Hutchinson presided in Main street church as pastor. His term comes to an end at the close of this month.

AT ST. DAVID'S
Commencing at the morning service St. David's church on April 19 Rev. Hugh Miller, who favors union, will begin a series of sermons on the church union question. This announcement was made at the service last night.

New Leading Lady at Opera House Was Born To The Stage

Although she has been here but a week, Miss Hazel Shannon, leading lady of the F. James Carroll Players, has demonstrated the fact that she is an actress of finished artistry, possesses a charming voice and character, is pretty and graceful, and promises much in her enacting during the balance of the present season. Mr. Carroll has been congratulated by many on his good fortune in being able to secure her services.

Miss Shannon's acting is that of an experienced artist, for, being the daughter of a showman who has been in the profession for more than 20 years, and her mother with almost a long theatrical career, she was born on the road and made her first appearance before the public when but three years old—as Lillian Waterman in Frou Frou, in which her parents were starring. A brother, also born to the profession, is now the leader of an 11-piece jazz band on the big time vaudeville circuit. The two children were educated on the road, a governess being carried as a member of the Shannon company.

Musical Education.
Miss Shannon's musical education was not overlooked and, before taking up the stage as her permanent vocation, she was given a course at the New England Conservatory of Music. Since that she has appeared in a variety of stage performances, including stock, vaudeville, musical comedy and traveling productions, playing leading roles in which her parents were starring. She is still going strong through the middle south, but with other organizations as well.

Her more recent engagements included 33 weeks in stock at Evansville, Ind.; four months at Fort Wayne, Ind.; two seasons as leading lady at the Garrick Theatre, Milwaukee; one year in Toledo, and, just before coming to Saint John, was leading lady with a company playing the Warburton Theatre, Yonkers, N. Y. Miss Shannon, like two or three other members of the Carroll Players, is a native of Ohio—"Where many of the U. S. Presidents came from," is the way they put it.

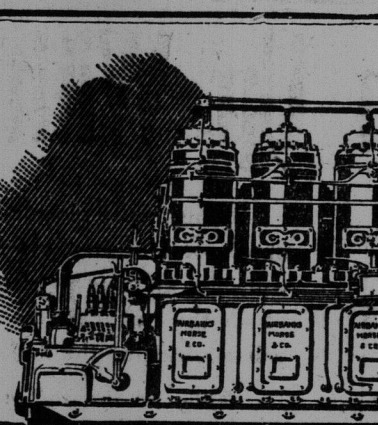
Rev. Mr. Fulton preached a companion sermon to that of the morning on "The Kingdom of Christ."
