From our own correspondent.) Boston, Aug. 28 .- The present sumner has been the coolest in many years here, and the records show a neavy rain fall for the season up to date. Those returning from summer resorts fear that next month will be a corcher in view of the average low emperature of July and August. The bureau of statistics reports that during the fiscal year which ended June 30 the imports from Canada amounted to \$40,309,387, and the ex-ports \$58,465,048.


