DISCUSSED LAWS WOULD NOT GIVE AND NEW TARIFF RUNNING RIGHTS
Duty on Refined Sugar Reduced 1-2 Cents Per Cwt. Moncton Board of Trade Opposes C. P. R. Application

Other Tariff Changes—Enforcement of Federal Laws Will Not be Transferred to the Dominion
And Will Ask Other Boards to Support Strong Resolution Passed at Last Night's Meeting

OTTAWA, Ont., March 5.—The common talk of the enforcement of the laws and the new tariff. W. P. Macdonald expressed the opinion that in respect to the alien labor law the power of settlement and the labor laws for settlement of the provinces and many other similar provisions the provinces could not be expected to enforce them successfully.
 He moved, "That the opinion of the house is that the government are responsible for the duty of enforcement of federal laws and that if any further legislation is necessary to secure such enforcement and punishment of violators thereof, it is the duty of the government to forthwith introduce such legislation."
 Mr. Aylesworth said the British North America act required the provinces to enforce the laws and the present system had been followed by the first minister of justice of Canada, John A. Macdonald, and had been followed ever since.
 R. L. Borden sympathized with Mr. Macdonald's object, but thought the resolution went too far, as it meant the federal government would have to enforce all the criminal laws.
 Mr. Monk wanted the Dominion to relieve the provinces of the expense of enforcing criminal prosecutions.
 Sir Wilfrid was opposed to the enforcement of federal laws being transferred to the Dominion.
 Mr. Macdonald said he had only offered the resolution for discussion, and it was declared lost on division.
 The house went into committee of ways and means on motion of Hon. Mr. Fielding to take up the tariff changes.
 Mr. Fielding announced that the tariff brought down in November had made a great deal of progress, which had been held back at the time of the production of the tariff. The government had decided that the request was reasonable, and instead of being admitted free, a duty was placed on it of 7c a bushel, British preference, 10c intermediate and general tariff.
 The duty on fresh tomatoes, which was brought down in November at 50c and 75c a bushel, preference, intermediate and general tariff, is changed to 20c per cent. preference, 25c intermediate and 30c general.
 The duty on plums under the general tariff is increased from 20c to 40c a bushel to 30c a bushel.
 Re sugar duties, Mr. Fielding said there was no change in the duty on packages reduced the duty on refined about 1 1/2 cents a hundred.
 The old duty British preference on raw sugar was 25c. When the budget was brought down in November, the duty on raw sugar was increased to 40c a hundred. The sugar refiners had protested against this, claiming that they were placed at a disadvantage of 7 cents a hundred by the proposed change. It had been decided to concede something to the refiners, though not to meet their whole demand.
 However, the duty on raw sugar would hereafter be 4 1/2 cents per hundred weight.
 Mr. Fielding announced a change in duty designed to increase the operation of beet sugar factories in Canada. It had been decided to admit for three years at the British preference rate raw beet sugar. But a refiner could only import this to the amount of two pounds for each pound of Canadian sugar he produced.
 The result would be the farmer would be benefited because the refiner would want to handle as many Canadian beets as possible in the fall to get the privilege of importing raw beet sugar at other stations to keep his refinery in operation.
 At the end of three years the refiners should be ready to handle large quantities of Canadian grown beets into raw sugar, and later refine, and thereby extending the lengths of operation of their factories.
 At item syrups 35c, B. P. 45c, intermediate; 50c general; schedule was amended to read 40c, 55c, and 62-1/2c respectively. Arising out of duty put on flaxseed Mr. Fielding announced that there was an increase of five cents per gallon on varnishes, lacquers, Japanese lac, and that duties on linseed or flaxseed oil per 100 pounds would be British preferential 12c, intermediate tariff 15c, 55c and 65c. In respect to rolled iron or steel beams, Mr. Fielding stated that it was proposed to fix duty at that constructors of bridges, cars, and those engaged in structural processes would be treated alike. Progress was reported and the house adjourned at midnight.

INTERESTING FIGHT IN SYDNEY OVER CIVIC ELECTIONS

HALIFAX, N. S., March 5.—A hot civic election in Sydney today resulted in the election of F. C. Kline as mayor over Ald. Finlay Macdonald by a majority of 183. Aldermen elected were: Ward 1, V. Mullins, majority 113; ward 2, Dr. E. M. McDonald, majority 38; ward 3, A. D. Gunn, majority 48; ward 4, N. M. Lennan, majority 70; ward 5, W. Fitzgerald, majority 316.
 The question of continuing or withdrawing of the grants at present enjoyed by the Sydney Catholic convents was made an issue and dominated the contest, to the practical exclusion of all the other questions. Decision recorded by the ratepayers is result of the deliberate thought and followed the campaign, during which the merits of the question were discussed by a number of the cleverest representatives of the opposing parties.
