The interior is beautifully decorated with a green and white color effect, with the side walls blended in a delicate crimson and pink. **MONCTON'S POLICE

MONCTON, May 1.—After a conference with the police commissioners this afternoon, Chief Rideout reconsidered his determination to leave the force and withdrew his resignation. LICENSES REDUCED.
TORONTO, May 1.—By local option and license reduction throughout Ontario, 120 hotel licenses were cut off today.
OTTAWA, April 30.—The Ottawa-Li-coy License Commissioners have cut off eleven of the local licenses, five of shops and six of hotels. This will leave 50 tavern licenses and 26 shop licenses, probably the smallest number in the last thirty or forty years. Three additional licenses may be allowed if certain conditions are complied with. The tavern licenses cut off are: Joseph Langlois, the Arroyo; A. Larose, the Transvaal; Oscar Landrua, Ottawa East; Patrick Baxter, Baxter Hotel; W. L. Quavis, the Bodega; W. H. Farrell, the Oxford.
