500 BOYS FOR DRILL DISPLAY UP THE RIVER

Mr. Herbert J. Smith has an interesting occupation for his spare hours in the time intervening between noon and August. He is to have charge of the drilling of between 400 and 500 members of the Temple of Honor sections in preparation for a military spectacle to be seen here in connection with the world's convention of the Temple of Honor, to be held in this city in August.
