ical Sketches."

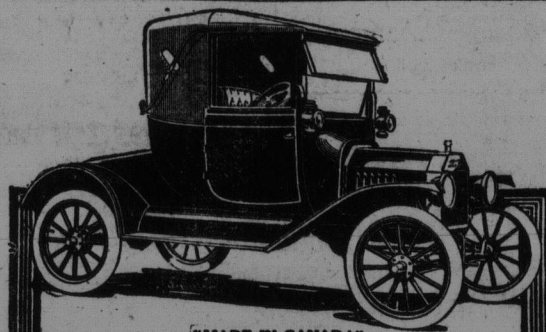
Arrangements were made for the

## Live Sporting News

GRIDIRON  
FATALITIES  
16 FOR YEAR

Sixteen Years of Fatalities on the  
Gridiron

Chicago, Nov. 29.—Despite the gen-  
eral improvement in the playing of in-  
tercollegiate football, the gridiron  
dead for the season approached the  
average casualty list for the last fif-  
teen years. The total this season is  
sixteen, as against thirteen last year,  
fourteen in 1913, thirteen in 1912 and  
eleven in 1911.

The killed do not come anywhere  
near the totals of 1903, 1905, 1909 or  
1910, as is shown in a subjoined table.  
The high mark was reached in 1903  
with forty-four dead. The outcry  
which followed reduced the killed to  
fourteen in the following year, but  
again it rose to twenty-four in 1905.  
Then came another tinkering of the  
rules, with the game ousted in scores  
of high schools and colleges.

The list showed a decrease, but in  
1909 it jumped to thirty, and twenty-  
two victims in 1910. Since then it  
has been on an even keel, the highest  
total being reached this year. It will  
be seen that the average is slightly  
over seventeen for fifteen years, so  
this year's total is under the normal  
casualty list.

In serious injuries the list this year  
shows a marked decrease. Frequent-  
ly reports have been sent out about  
players suffering serious injuries only  
to have these same pig-skin chasers  
in practice a day or two later. Cor-  
respondents have found it easy to give  
players concussion of the brain and  
broken bones only to have these men  
back on the gridiron in a few days.

There is, however, another side  
which must be taken into considera-  
tion in charging up the fifteen dead  
to the sport. The season, just over,  
showed the greatest army of players  
which has ever been seen on the  
country's gridirons. Over 3,000 games  
were listed among colleges and  
schools.

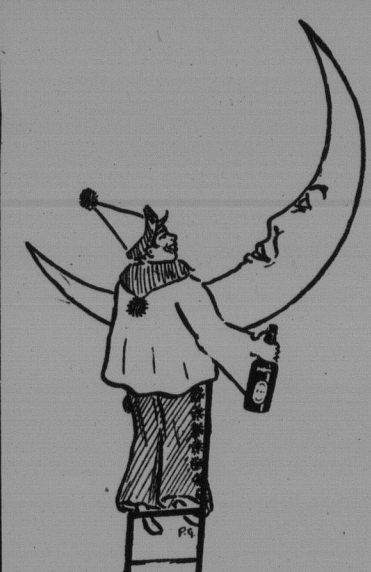
