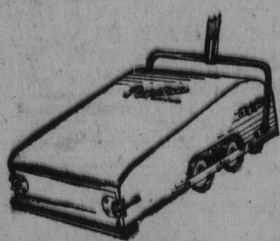

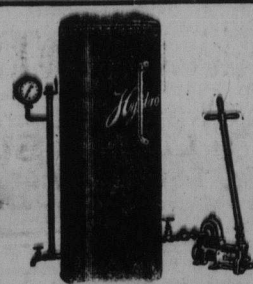

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GRANTS WERE
DEALT WITH
YESTERDAY
FOR PIGEON
AND ROSS BOYS

Total Amount is \$587 Less Than Last Year—Tenders Opened for Asphalt.

At the committee meeting of the common council held yesterday afternoon the grants for the year were passed with the exception of the amount for hand concerts which will be taken up later.

Some of the applicants were given increases but the amount to the Playgrounds Association was cut \$1,500, which will make the total amount \$587.50 less than last year.

The tenders for asphalt were opened and referred to the mayor, Commissioner Fisher and Road Engineer Hatfield.

A communication from the trustees of St. David's church to the effect that they have objected to the erection of a proposed garage within the prescribed distance of the church was referred to the commissioner of safety.

J. S. Currie appeared and asked if he could obtain the names that had been added to the voters' list in the last few years and was referred to the chairman of the Board of Assessors. The mayor called the meeting to order at 4:30 all the commissioners being in attendance.

The mayor read a letter from the trustees of St. David's church to the effect that they had no objection to the erection of a proposed garage which would come within the prescribed distance of the church. This was referred to the commissioner of safety.

The next business was the grants and these were passed as follows: Tuberculosis Association, \$500; Agricultural Society, \$275; Seamen's Mission, \$250; Associated Charities, \$225; Victorian Order of Nurses, \$1,000; Free Kindergarten, \$750; Playgrounds Association, \$2,500; Natural History Society, \$400; S. P. C., \$150; Ladies' Auxiliary S. P. C., \$75; Tourist Association, \$62.50; Home of Good Shepherd, \$500.

Increases were granted to the Seamen's Mission, Victorian Nurses and the Natural History Society. The grant to the Home of Good Shepherd is a new one. The amount for hand concerts was not dealt with and the application of the Syrian Relief Association was deferred.

J. S. Currie appeared before the council and asked if it would be possible to get the names of the men who had been added to the voters' list for the last 15 years or the men between 21 and 36 and was referred to the chairman of the Board of Assessors.

The tenders for asphalt were opened. Before they were opened Road Engineer Hatfield was heard and recommended the samples submitted as follows: California asphalt supplied by Warren Bros., first; Mexican asphalt supplied by Carrite Paterson Co., second; and Bermuda asphalt, supplied by Barbour Asphalt Co., third.

The tenders were: Carrite Paterson Co., Texas, \$27; Mexican, \$24.50 per ton; J. T. Kashtan & Co., \$29 per ton; Imperial Oil Co., \$24.90 per ton; Barbour Asphalt Co., Bermuda, \$45.14; Trinidad, \$33.22 per ton; Warren Bros., \$30 per ton.

They were referred to the mayor and Commissioner Fisher. No further business offering the council adjourned.

VARIETY IN WEATHER
CONDITIONS TODAY

The Weather Man Gave St. John An Experience of All Kinds and Conditions Yesterday—The Ice Sidewalks

St. John experienced a mixture of all kinds of weather yesterday. In fact it snowed and rained, and it was hot and it was cold. The day opened with a heavy snowstorm accompanied by strong gusts of wind attaining a maximum of forty-eight miles an hour. In the afternoon the snow turned to rain, about half an inch falling during the afternoon and early evening. Strong to moderate gales from the southwest prevailed during the evening, decreasing towards midnight. There was a decided change in temperature during the day. In the morning the minimum was reached, the thermometer registering zero, while in the evening a maximum of forty degrees above was reached. The large variation in temperature is considered by Director Hutchinson as most unusual.
