HUNS HAVE SUFFERED 2,500,000 CASUALTIES

London, Nov. 4.—At dawn this morning British troops south of the Scheldt River attacked on a wide front, according to a report received from Field Marshal Haig today. The report says that the attack has been lauchede astisfactorily. Military authorities, who three weeks ago were skeptical over the re-turn of peace because of the military
