FREDERICTON.

Fredericton, Jan. 18.—(Special)—The York county council this afternoon got out of the tangle which had been created over the re-appointing of J. W. McCready to the position. A motion which had been adopted at the morning session closing the nominations was rescinded after a sharp debate and McCready was put in nomination, it having been discovered that Harry P. McLeod, who had made strong pull for the position, was not a county taxpayer. F. H. Peters was also nominated and received nine votes against eighteen for McCready.

Only yesterday Mr. McCready tendered his resignation, which the committee accepted. Strange to say the councillors who have been elected in declaring that it was wrong for Mr. McCready to jointly hold office under city and county councils in his favor. But for the talk made by these councillors it is doubtful if he would have tendered his resignation.

The most serious objection advanced against Mr. Peters was that his political views were not in accord with those of a majority of the council.

Victoria hospital will as usual receive the grant of \$800 from the council and the money will be paid over unconditionally. This was decided on this afternoon after the council had listened to an address from T. C. Carson, Allen, vice-president of the trustees board. Mr. Allen made a full explanation in regard to the management and regulations of the institution and proved the stories about the people being refused admission because of lack of funds were all fiction. He had been connected with the trustees board for eighteen years and had yet to learn of a case where a person was refused admission to the hospital because of inability to pay. He went even further and assured the councillors that if they could prove that the contrary was the case the trustees would not accept one dollar from the board this year. Mr. Allen's remarks were convincing and the resolution imposing conditions in regard to the grant was unanimously withdrawn and the full amount was unanimously voted.

A delegation from the executive of the agricultural society waited upon the council and urged that a grant of \$500 be made in aid of the exhibition to be held here next fall. The delegation was given an attentive hearing and a vote of thanks but the motion to make the grant asked for only found seven supporters out of a council of 28.

Moncton, N. B., Jan. 17.—P. S. Archibald, C. E., chairman of the arbitration board for the Newfoundland Railway Company vs. the Newfoundland government,

arrived home this morning from Toronto, where the arbitration court has been sitting. The arbitrators were unanimous in their award to the Reid company, for the telegraph system expropriated by the Newfoundland government. Sir Edward Morris, minister of justice for Newfoundland, and others engaged in the case, passed through on route home. It is understood that the arbitrators, consisting of P. S. Archibald, Moncton; Chairman Sir Edward Blake, and Donald McMaster, K. C., will receive \$15,000 each for their services. Friends here have just received word that George L. Moncton, Jan. 18.—Dr. Inch, chief superintendent of education, has notified the Moncton school board that the province board of education has power to make a grant to a teacher of music in the public schools. The Moncton school board made application for a grant to Miss McCarthy, who has been engaged to teach music in the city school. Dr. Inch suggests that legislation be sought giving the provincial board power to make a grant for such purposes.

The amount asked by the Moncton school board from the city to run the schools during the year 1905 is \$22,381. Added to this the county fund of \$2,381, the total makes the total cost of the city schools for the year, \$24,762.

The school board is forcing the matter of providing more school accommodation. At least two new schools will likely have to be provided this year.

SIX DEAD IN BRITISH
RAILWAY WRECK

London, Jan. 19.—An alarming collision, in which three trains were involved, occurred on the Midland Railway, near Harvick, early this morning. Four passengers and two railway men were killed, and a score were injured, of which seven were seriously hurt. The accident occurred when a passenger train running into the wreckage resulting from the first collision. The cars of one of the Scotch expresses burst into flames, and were soon a mass of smouldering wreckage. There were not many passengers on the train, or the casualties must have been far heavier, as the impact was so great that the cars were telescoped and splintered in a matchwood.
