ROUTINE BUSINESS

AT SCHOOL BOARD

Board reluctantly accepted resignation of Miss Edna Kaufman. The regular monthly meeting of the Public School Board was held last night the following members being present: Allan Shantz in the chair and Messrs. Dr. F. J. Weidenhammer, Dr. C. T. Noecker, J. Bruegeman, C. Hemphill, C. W. Snider and A. E. Devitt.

Accepted Resignation With Regret
The Board received a communication from Miss Edna Kaufman, teacher at the Alexandria school, enclosing her resignation same to take effect within thirty days. Miss Kaufman has accepted another position in town and the Board while regretting exceedingly to lose Miss Kaufman accepted. The secretary was instructed to secure a teacher to fill the vacancy locally if possible, and if not then to advertise.

Health of Children to be Looked After.

A committee composed of Dr. Weidenhammer and Dr. Noecker were appointed to arrange with the local Victorian Nurse in town to have a systematic inspection made regularly of the children at both the Public and Alexandria Schools. If this arrangement can be made it will no doubt be of great benefit in nipping in the bud any communicable disease and help prevent an epidemic of sickness in town. The move is one in the right direction and it is to be hoped the committee will be successful in their efforts.

There was considerable routine business transacted and accounts amounting to \$1344.88 were passed and ordered to be paid. Adjournment was made at 9:30 o'clock.

Nafe, Levi Graybill (deceased), C.M. Taylor (deceased).

IDEA SUBMITTED TO HOSPITAL BOARD

NAMELY TO BUILD NEW SISTERS OF CHARITY HOSPITAL ON K. & W. PROPERTY

Definite Proposition Is Expected Will Go Before Board

At the annual meeting of the Hospital Trust last evening an important idea was submitted to the members. It was to have the proposed hospital that is to be built by the Sisters of Charity in this city located on the Kitchener and Waterloo Hospital property near the present hospital, thereby giving advantages to the city and all parties concerned.

While no action could be taken on the matter at this meeting several members of the Trust spoke favorably on the proposal. It is expected that the proposal will go before the Board and receive thorough consideration. In the meantime the deed in which the property was transferred to the city, by the late Joseph Seagram will be pursued in order to ascertain whether or not the terms of the deed will permit the proposed hospital to be built on the property.

The idea was submitted by Mr. L. D. Merriek, a member of the Trust of the Kitchener and Waterloo Hospital Board. After Mr. Merriek had outlined the proposal and pointed out the reasons for making the suggestion, President Kabel and other members of the Board expressed their appreciation of the matter having been brought up and impressed the wisdom of investigating it.

In regard to the merits of the proposal some facts were pointed out to the Trust. For years a considerable part of the end of the Kitchener and Waterloo Hospital has lain vacant and the city has had to bear the frontage tax.

It is pointed out that were this new hospital, which it is certain will be built, near the present institution, it would mean increased efficiency as compared to the conditions that would result if it were located in any other part of the city. The two hospitals being close to each other, doctors would save valuable time in visiting their patients.

A point which is worth noting is that the hospitals which are operated by the Sisters are not limited to one class of religion only. They are open to men and women of all faiths and any minister has a right to visit the institution at any other hospital.

As said above the idea has found favor with members who have expressed their ideas as private individuals. As soon as something definite is forthcoming to the Board, the idea will be considered and carefully weighed.

One thing is certain and that is that no matter where the location the hospital will be built. The Sisters of Charity have options on several sites, one of which is the Crescent at the end of South Queen Street.

TWIN-CITY T. & L. COUNCIL MET.

Delegate George Zimmerman, Vice-President.

The usual bi-monthly meeting was held last evening. President O. H. Hughes occupying the chair. The delegates were numerous. The newly formed typographical union having its representatives received and seated.

The Upholsterers Strike. This has almost reached a termination and all reports to the contrary notwithstanding, the boys have gained their demands. A minimum wage of 60c per hour, time and a half for overtime and a 50 hour week. Four shops are still holding out.

A New Vice President. Delegate Weinstein, Vice-President, having left the city, delegate George Zimmerman was elected to fill the office for the remainder of the term.

Develop the Social Side. A lengthy discussion took place over the proposed Labor Club. A place for sociability during the winter months was greatly needed so a strong committee to "count the cost" and submit probabilities, was named with power to act on their number.

Some Furniture Workers' Wages. Organizer Marsh, who is in the city on behalf of the Woodworkers, gave a few prices paid furniture workers in this district. In Hanover some men are getting less than 20c per hour, and any amount of men are getting the princely sum of 25 cents, he said. In this Christian era it is easily figured how many pounds of butter and pecks of potatoes can be had for this money; \$2.50 per day of 10 hrs. he remarked.

Prices of furniture at the present time would denote that woodworkers were getting something better than investigation shows.

Organization Meetings. It is proposed to further the work of organization by holding meetings every alternate Sunday in some local theatre.
