Trustees are meeting.
The local public school Board is represented at the meeting of urban school trustees in St. Catharines today when it is expected a permanent organization will be effected.

Jewellers Meeting.
The Ontario Jewellers association is meeting in Hamilton for the purpose of enlarging the organization. As far as is known no local jewellers are in attendance.

Defect in Roadbed.
Owing to a defect in the roadbed on East King street cars are obliged to use the South rail they switch over at the city hall. While it delays traffic a little no inconvenience has been caused the public.

Resolution Asking for Trial by Jury
The local Trades and Labor Council at the regular meeting last evening passed a resolution requesting the Prime Minister, Sir Robert Borden, and the Minister of Labor, Hon. Mr. Robertson, who give the men arrested in Winnipeg a trial by jury. In case this is not done the local Council further declare that they will not be responsible if any unions go out on strike.

An Alleged Still Seized.
Inspector J. Winterhalt has made a seizure of liquor and an alleged still in a residence on Park street, Waterloo. The apparatus was discovered in the cellar. The supply of liquor was not large, about two and a half gallons. While the owner has not acknowledged the claim of the official, a charge will be laid against him.

Splendid Specimen of Strawberries.
Splendid specimen of strawberries are to be seen in the garden of Mr. Herman Schuster, 60 Factory Road. This morning the Record had the privilege of seeing a number of the berries which were shown by Mr. Schuster. They are of an unusually large variety Mr. Schuster states they are Florida Beauties. They were planted last August and in this first season they are bearing abundantly. Mr. Schuster states the soil in which they are planted is mucky.

F.W.D. Still Waiting for Railway
In connection with a member of the Directorate of the Four Wheel Drive Auto Company, Ltd., the Record was informed that the building operations of the company have been held up on account of the fact that it is still not known where the future location of the Grand River tracks in the east end will be. When the engineers were here some weeks ago it was stated that the Company would soon know the exact location but nothing more has been heard. The proposed change in location as is known is due to the fact that the Company is preparing for emergencies in case of termination of running rights over the city's streets. A new agreement between the company and the city must be framed in October. It is the intention, however, to build this year. It is understood that the building will measure about 100 by 150 feet.

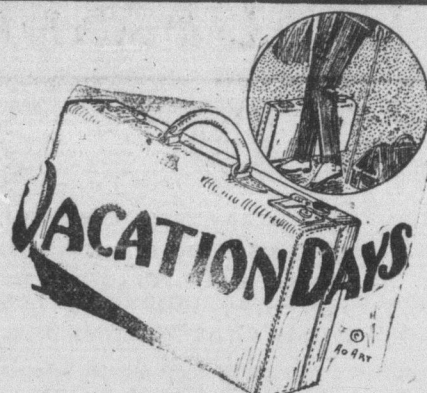
