How Indemnity May Be Collected by the Allies

FIVE BILLION CASH AND TWENTY BILLION IN BONDS
 PARIS, April 14.—Germany, under the peace treaty must pay five billion in cash or its equivalent in commodities before May 1, 1921. She must also issue immediately to the allies and associated governments twenty billion dollars in interest-bearing bonds.

The interest on bonds, until 1926, will be either two or three per cent, and after that date five per cent, according to the present plan. The bonds will be payable in instalments during a period of fifteen years. They will probably be kept in control of a central commission of allied and associated governments, so that they shall not be marketed in quantities sufficient to break the price.

Further War Expected by Count Reventlow

DOES NOT BELIEVE PERMANENT PEACE COMING
 (Special To The Record).
 BASLE, April 14.—Count von Reventlow, former military expert of the Berliner Tageblatt, in an interview telegraphed here today, declared he favors the restoration of a liberalized monarchy.

"The militarist spirit does not exist in Germany," he is quoted as saying. "It is a spirit of defense, natural everywhere. If we had a national spirit as strong as the French, we would have won the first battle of the Marne. I do not believe the present conference will make a general and lasting peace. Further war is inevitable. Peace cannot be just, unless Germany is considered a belligerent and treated as such."

M. Broda Pessimistic


DECLARES GERMANY IS MAKING PREPARATIONS.
 PARIS, April 14.—The Mastin published an interview today with M. Broda, President of a Czech-Slovak delegation, representing the Slavs of Saxony and Silesia, declared that Germany is secretly carrying on extensive military preparations. Guns, shells, airplanes and machine guns are being moved into Silesia and Saxony.

Broda charged that Field Marshal von Hindenburg is backing the military preparations.

Has Resigned From St. Andrew's Charge

Rev. Dr. Scott Compelled To Take A Rest.
 A surprise was rendered at the morning services yesterday at St. Andrew's Church. The pastor, Rev. Marous Scott, D.D., announced that he had decided to resign the ministerial post and that the resignation had been forwarded to the Secretary of the Guelph Presbytery to take effect at the end of the month. Dr. Scott stated that he had been compelled to seek a rest, and that he therefore had to relinquish the pastorate which he filled for the past six years. His retirement has caused general regret in the congregation.
