tercollegiate debate at Charlottetown. Defending the negative of the resolution "That Canada should expand its present immigration program on a selective basis", Dal-
housie was represented by Mark Yeoman (leader) and Don MacEachern. The St. Dunstan's team was compoed of James O'Keef (leader) and Francis Bolger. the resolution, called for more im migration to lessen the overhea expense of running this country They referred to the vast areas of this country, which are greatly in need of population, and the fact that with more people Canada could consume more of the goods it produces.
The negative pointed out that Canada only gets an undesirabl grade of immigrants who come here because they were failures at home. It was also shown that Can da will have enough to do to provide employment for its own peo ple, least of all more immigrants The poor type of allegiance many mmigrants show, and the fact that they displace so many of our own workers, were also advanced as reasons for immigration.
