to feel that the Party needs & solicits his assistance.

that they have been asked. It is one method  
of making our Party a real democratic party, in  
its methods at least.

But whether this plan is attempted or not I do firmly  
believe the time is very opportune for building up  
the Party in anticipation of a long lease of power.

I find business a little slow. I was compelled to  
allow the Hospital property to revert to the previous owners  
So I am left pretty bare of the "root of all evil". However I  
do not feel beaten, though it is possible I may have to  
seek other fields for practice, rather than spend several  
years here in attempting to build up a clientele.
