

APPEAL TO HOSTESSES.

Rev. Prof. Cody Depicts the Danger e

Rev. Prof. Cody, rector in charge of St. Faul's Anglican church, Toronto, recently preached on temperance—"temperance in the broad New Testament sense." The sermon was the third in a series on the cardinal virtues. The church was filled to the doors. Prof. Cody defined temperance as

Prof. Cody defined temperance as self-control, or government of the lower nature by the higher. Coming to temperance in its accepted meaning he appealed for greater care among hostesses, and said: "If some of the tales one hears be true, much of the exhilaration felt by many of the guests at afternoon teas and other social affairs, particularly among the younger members. ularly among the younger members, is due to intoxication—slight, perhaps, and oftentimes unconscious, but none the less intoxication." Afternoon teas, he added, in many instances appeared to be "afternoon drinks."

The Christian Ideal.

The Christian Ideal.

After defining temperance, Prof. Cody said that mankind was so constituted that certain parts of his nature were meant to be governed by other parts, this principle being known as the Hebraism, or restraint. The doctrine of Hellenism, on the contrary, taught that all parts of man's nature should be developed alike. The latter principle, however, was condemned by its results, as the application of it brought physical and moral ruin. The two doctrines found their reconciliation in the Christian ideal, which combined the highest elements which combined the highest element of both. Such bodily appetites as sex, eating and drinking, when pro-perly controlled, produced beautiful and beneficent results. One important application of temperance was in the control of the mind, so as to bar out unworthy and debasing thoughts, and the cultivation of high, noble and elevating ideals.

Danger to the Mother Land. Danger to the Mother Land.
The real danger to the mother-land, Prof. Cody said, was the dan-ger of drunkenness. In this respect Canada was greatly ahead of Great Britain, where the drunkenness of the Britain, where the drunkenness of the working classes was a positive danger to the industrial supremacy of the nation, which could not hope to hold its own against sober competitors. The essence of the sin of drinking was in the subordination of the spirit by the flesh, thereby dethroning the proper sovereign of life. The personal duty of the individual in the matter of drinking must be dealing the proper solution. in the matter of drinking must be de-cided by each according to the dictates of conscience. One must consider his duty to himself, to others, and to God. Was indulgence necessary to promote health, would it make the head clearer for business, and was there danger of the habit growing beyond control? Secondly was it the duty of the Christian to follow the Pauline principle, 'If meat maketh my brother to stumble, meat maketh my brother to stumble, and I will eat no meat while the world standeth?"

As for the Christian's duty to God, the final test must be Paul's injunction' to do all things to the glory of God.

Beware of the Egg That Floats. A new method of testing eggs for their freshness has been communicated to the Agricultural Society of Saxony. An egg plunged in water tends to rise with more buoyancy, according to its age, owing to the enlargement of the empty space at the thick end by evaporation of water from the white. Hence the egg takes a different position in the water. Fresh eggs remain horizontal. takes a different position in the water. Fresh eggs remain horizontal, an egg three to five days old makes an angle of twenty degrees with the horizon, one eight days old gives an angle over forty-five degrees, and at the end of fourteen days the angle is sixty degrees. An egg three weeks old lies at seventy degrees. One three months old remains vertical, and when it is older still it floats.
