ENEMY DEBTORS AND

London, June 21.—The Employers' Parliamentary Association, as a correspondent points out in the Fin-ancial Times, has rendered a valuable service to all British creditors with allen enemy debtors by endea-voring to bring pressure upon the Imperial Govern-ment to secure that, on the conclusion of hostilities, British creditors of allen apprise shall be creditors to British creditors of allen enemies shall be entitled to the liquidation of the sums due to them by the Government of their debtors, it being left to the latter to arrange matters as best they can with their political epresentatives. It is known that the authorities at Westminster are willing to take such action if there is a sufficient volume of public opinion in this country to justify them in so doing, and it is, therefore, neces sary that all who have debts due to them from Germany, Austria or Turkey should disclose their posimany, Austria or Turkey should disclose their posi-api to admit in advance of the maturity of crops then and associate themselves with a movement designed solely for their good. Very many business houses in the United Kingdom have been embarrassed during the past ten months by the fact that they have been unable to secure remittances from any of the countries with whom we are at war. The initial difficulties relating to this matter have b overcome partly by the machinery already established by the British Government, but it is requisite that more should be done, and the policy suggested by the Employers' Parliamentary Association meets the sit ation admirate.
