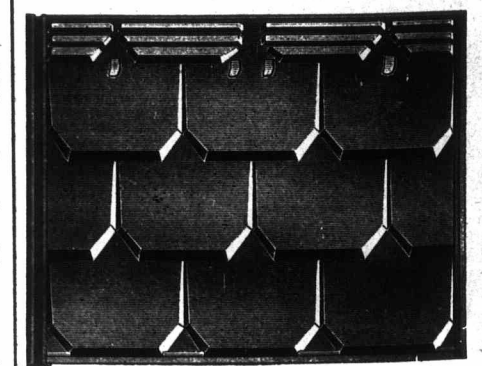
## FARMERS SHOULD EXPERIMENT
