HONOLULU, June 3, via San Francisco, Cal., June 13.-The volcano Kilauea is active, according to a report received here today by steamer. Flames and smoke are rising above the crater. The outbreak occurred June 3. Up to the time of last reports, dated yesterday, it was continuing. The outbreak has been foreshadowed many days. There also have been slight earthquakes. No eruptions of lava or ashes have taken place.
