Ships carrying the first detachments of the allied expeditionary force arrived off Salonica on October 6th and began the disembarkation in the bay, which is faced on the east by the Grand Karaburun, and into which the Vardar flows on the northwest. While the landing was in progress British and French destroyers and British cruisers guarded the entrance to the port. The detachments were concentrated on the plateau of Santa Paraskevi, some two miles from the city. This plateau was part of the territory ceded to Serbia after the treaty of 1913. From Paraskevi the troops were then rapidly transferred to the Serbian border by the Salonica-Uskub Railway.

Teuton Hatred of Serbia Due to Political Causes

London, Oct. 26. (Special Despatch.)—Why the Central Powers hate Serbia is the subject of an article by Mr. Wladyslaw Czerniewski, a prominent Serbian now in London, in the Daily Graphic. "The endeavor of the Central Powers to drag Bulgaria into a suicidal war has two objects," he writes. "It may open a way for them to exhaust Turkey and will facilitate the punishment of Serbia."

German Conductor Palmed Off Vienna March for Serbian Anthem

London, Oct. 26. (Special Despatch.)—Herr Paul Scheinplung, conductor of the Bluetner Orchestra, in Berlin, has recently returned home after nearly a year's imprisonment in Russia. His experiences have been published in the German newspapers. "At the beginning of hostilities," he says, "I was filling an engagement in Riga with a symphony orchestra composed mainly of Germans. On Friday, July 31, we were interrupted in the middle of Beethoven's Symphony in C flat by the sudden appearance of a disorderly crowd which stormed into the auditorium, shouting and waving flags of the Allies. In front of the stage they stopped and their leader, a fanatical student, ordered us all to stand up and play the Russian national anthem. This we did three times. Then we had to render French and English national airs. Finally someone called out: 'Let us have the Serbian anthem.' That was a stroke, for none of us knew it. Still, I surmised that it was not likely that any one else in the crowd was acquainted with it, and so we tuned up and played the march from one of Lehar's overtures. The Russians had taken Berlin and made the Kaiser a prisoner and that the Rhine had been crossed by the German army. We were told that the Russian fleet had annihilated that of Germany."
