### JAMES INNES DEAD.

Veteran Journalist and Parliamentarian Died of Heart Disease at Sydney, C.B.

Guelp, July 18.—A telegram received here at 2.50 p. m. yesterday announced the death at Sydney, C.B., of Mr. James Innes, ex-M.P. for South Wellington. Mr. Innes was on his way to spend a month with his old friend Mr. Reid of St. John's, Newfoundland. Mr. Innes was a native of Huntley, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, born on Feb. 1st, 1838. He was educated there and at the Aberdeen Grammar School. For five years he taught school before coming to Canada with the family in 1863. In 1863, in company with the late John C. McLaughlin, proprietor of The Vancouver World, he took hold of The Mercury and made it a success in the Reform interests. Mr. Innes was married in 1878 to Helen Gerard, widow of Jonathan Dale, Planter, Granada, W. I., also a native of Aberdeenshire. They had no family; Mrs. Innes died four years ago.

Killed by Lightning. Edmonton, N.W.T., July 17.—News has just been received in Edmonton of the death from lightning of Halbrechts Peter Ward, J. Buleau and L. Courti, near Moringville, 25 miles north of Edmonton, on Sunday morning. They were in a tape with Indians. Indians were stunned but have recovered. The tent was ripped to pieces.


