

THE METEOR

Editor Planet: While I was at the G. T. R. station at London on Monday morning at about a quarter to six o'clock, about thirty people standing there, witnessed the brilliant spectacle of the meteor which seemed to pass over the city at a distance of only a few hundred feet from the earth. It was then of the appearance of the size of the moon at high, and was red in color, leaving vapor streak in its path, which at first resembled a live or frosted wire. But for a few minutes it became of cloudy appearance and the zig-zag shape and the cloud seemed to indicate that it was caused by the revolutions of the meteor. When I was relating the phenomenon to parties here on my reaching Ridgetown, I learned that Dr. T. B. Marr, while driving into town that morning had witnessed the meteor in its flight and thought passed directly over Ridgetown and o him it seemed no higher than the spire of the Presbyterian church, which is less than 200 feet high. The neteor is a great deceiver.
