\$2,000 Voted for Deportation of Undesirable Immigrants.

Ottawa, April 22.—Hon. Charles S. Hyman has made a third and powerful effort to resign. Mr. Speaker, at the opening of the House on Saturday morning, read his resignation. It is adorned with two witnesses and a red seal and is probably regular. The letter is as follows:

"April 11, 1907.—Hon. R. F. Sutherland: I beg herewith to tender my resignation as member of the House of Commons for the elective division of London. (Signed) Charles S. Hyman; witnesses, Clarke and Finnan."

The House got into supply at noon and took up estimates of the Interior Department. Two thousand dollars was appropriated towards deporting undesirable immigrants. Last year 137 undesirables were deported.

LEGISLATURE IS CLOSED

Ontario House Prorogued On Saturday With Due Ceremony

Important Address Made By Lieut-Governor-Provincial Rights

Toronto, April 22.—At 2.30 on Saturday afternoon his Honor Lieut.-Governor Clark formally prorogued the Ontario Legislature.

The ceremony was very simple and quiet, being marked by none of the pomp or display of the opening.

Only a few members remained in the city to see the end, and only a few ladies occupied places on the floor of the House. Being Saturday afternoon, however, quite a large number of people filled in their leisure by viewing the proceedings from the gallery.

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His Honor, accompanied by his aides, Capt. Macdonald and Lieut. Young, was escorted by the Royal Canadian Dragoons. As they approached the buildings a salute of 15 guns was fired by "B" Battery of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery.

His Honor's address was somewhat longer than usual. It mentions all the important legislation of the session, and congratulates the members on the careful attention displayed.
