Toronto, June 13.—Self-defence is the plea which T. C. Robinette, K. C., will urge on behalf of John Boyd, who shot Edward Wandle Tuesday

Boyd says he went to the restaurant in the morning in search of the woman with whom he had been living. He had heard that a tall colored man, who kept a restaurant on York street, had called for her an a bicycle at her "boarding house" to "fix some clothes" for him. Boyd asked civilly for the woman, and says Wandle told him he did not want him round, struck him with a billy, and threw him into the street. Being afraid, he then purchased the revolver.

Later he walked north on York street to get _ shirt. Suddenly, as he was passing Wandle's, he received "two bings on the head," Wandle grabbed him by the vest and shirt, tearing them, and jerked him into the restaurant, saying, "Now, I've got

restaurant, saying, "Now, I've got you?"
Wandle, he says, kept on pounding him with the billy, and jerked him into the hallway. Then Boyd fixed two shots at random and turned to run, but was swung back toward the stairway, up which he fled, followed by Wandle. He went on down the hall, searching for a room in which to lade.

wandle disappeared, and Boyd went up the hall to Mrs. Isaac's room. The inner partition looked like a good cover, and he entered, when wandle appeared from behind the partition and struck him over the head with a chair. The revolver being still in his hand, he fired blindly, and field.

"Mrs." Boyd, a decrepit woman of about 50, declares that a week ago, the negro gave her an awful beating, and threatened to shoot her with a revolver he then had.

Boyd, when arraigned in the Police Court, was stolidly impassive. He pleaded not guilty to a charge of murder, and was remanded for a week.

TOWN IS PILLAGED.

Custom House Robbed of \$20,000 by Revolutionists.

San Salvador, Republic of Salvador, June 13.—A force of Nicaraguan filibusters landed at Acajutla and at once made their way to the Town of Sonsonate, where they plundered the custom house and stole \$20,000 from the local agency of the Bank of Salvador.

Salvadorean troops then appeared upon the scene and defeated the invaders, who fled precipitately back to Acajutia, where they re-embarked upon some vessels flying the Nicaraguan flag and made their way out of the harbor.

The entire country is in favor of the Government. Thousands of volunteers have offered their services in the fight for Salvador and President Figueroa is being generally acclaimed.

Montreel, June 13.—Rev. 8. 8. Conrardy of Canton, China, who is making a tour through Belgimm, England,
Canada, and the United States, with
the object of raising a fund to equip
a hospital and carry on his missionary work amongst the lepers, is in the
city. He was with Father Damien
when he died of leprosy.

While in Canton recently he came
in contact with 100,000 lepers utterly
deserted, but for the help they reocived from a few sisters of charity.

There was no pity shown to the
lepers by the Chinese, and he himself knew of many cases where parents had burnt alive children who
were developing this frightful discase.

Receives Ovation At Old Home-Danger of Foreign Immigration.
Picton, June 13.—The entire Bay of Quimte district, including the counties of Northumberland, Hastings, Lennox, Frontenac and Prince Edward, crowded the Town of Picton to suffocation yesterday in their anxiety to greet, welcome and appland Hon. Mr. Boblin, Premier of Manitoba, the "favorite son" of the county.

Premier Roblin was visibly affected by the heartness of the welcome. In his reply he dwelt upon a matter of national importance—the loyalty of the western land to the empire, and pointed out the danger which is being brought into existence by the immense foreign immigration.

PRISONER BURNED ALIVE.

Swise Explorer Brutally Murdered by Natives in Liberia.

Berne, Switzerland, June 13.—The Government has received information of the murder in the hinterland of Liberia of Walter Vols, the well-known Swiss explorer.

Plot to Kidnag.

Boise, Idaho, June 13.—The defence yesterday brought the cross-examination of Harry Orchard down to the actual crime charged against Wm. D. Haywood, the murder of ex-Governor Frank Steunemberg.

Probing into the crime was reached at midday and counsel for the defence directed their efforts to an attempt to prove the earlier purposes and movements of Orchard were uncertain and indefinite.

Then they emphasized the abandonment of all efforts at murder after Orchard first tracked Steunenberg to a hotel in Boise and with a skeleton key gained entrance to the room in which the ex-governor was staying.

Here they stopped for a moment to prove that Orchard twice wrote and once telephoned to "Bill" Esterly at Silver City to urge him to come and join in the projected crime, the direct implication being that Orchard endeavored to inveigle another federation man into the crime which would discredit and dishonor the organisation.

Then the witness was carried over his long journey into Korth Idaho, and his crime there, including a plot to kidnap and hold for ransom Paulsom's child.

Orchard swore that David Castesformerly lieutenant-governor of Colorado and late a publisher in Wallace, Idaho, first broached the kidnapping to Pettibone and himself at Denver. Paulson, once a poor miner, had made a fortune in the Hercules mins in which Orchard held an interest when the property was not paying; and it was believed that if his children were stolen he would pay \$50,000 or \$60,000 in ransom. Orchard said that when he went to North Idaho he got Jack Simpkins to enter the plot, and tegether they went to Coates to renew the scheme.

Coates was asked to stand up, and Orchard said he was the man, of whom he was testifying. Orchard was then asked whether he himself did not propose the crime to Coates, who immediately rebuffed him, and whether Jack Simpkins did not warn Paulson directly he heard of the plot. Orchard denied both suggestions, and insisted that Coates consented to stay in the plot and handle the mency they hoped to get from Paulson.

Then the defence had the witness admit a series of mean crimes. When reduced to poverty he reserved to pawning, borrowing and stealing. First he pawned jewelry and guns for \$25 to \$30. Then he accepted Paulson's hospitality, while he was plotting to steal Paulson's child. After that with Simpkins, he said, he broke into the Oregon Railway and Navigation Co.'s station. They were after a trunk full of jewelry samples, but instead, got a trunk full of shee samples. Next he tapped a cash register at Burke for \$30 and \$40. "I could send you many from the slums," said the Rev. Mr. Percival, smilingly, "but I know you do not want them." It was realized, however, that there was need for prompt action, as there was no prospect of replanishing the stores once they were exhausted. In consequence, the captain decided to put to sea in the lifeboat with two men, to seek aid. After sailing a thousand miles, he was picked up by a German barque, which eventually landed them at Sydney. Thence assistance was at once dispatched to the crew, who were subsequently brought back to regions of civilization.
