PACKED IN LOCKERS

How Four Chinese Were Smuggled to Chicago

To Chicago Chicago, June 12.--Disconforts suffered by the Chinese who were smuggled from the Mexican border to Chicago via the "dining car route" may be judged from the descrip-tion of how these journeys were made, as recited by witnesses who partcipated in the smuggling. As many as four Chinese were packed into a space six feel long, three feet wide, and only a foot or eighteen inches high, on top of an lee chest in the kitchens of the dining cars. dining cars.

One or two would be stuffed into the "pantry," an open space over the lockers "pantry." an open space over the lockers whero the crew kept their garments and bedding, about six feet long and not more than a foot wide. They were covered with table cloth and not allowed to move on make a sound, except for a few hours at night, when they had the freedom of the kitchen. For nearly two days they travelled in this cramped position before being taken from the train by the agent of the smuggler

From the train by the agenc of the sinuagiers at Joliet. While Government officials had been hot on the trail of the smugglers for a long time, they had been unable to discover how the Chines: were brought north.
