I. C. R. Pictures Prove Popular

At one of the principal Bulletin Stations of the New York Herald on election night, the waiting thousands on the street, eager for the election returns, had also an opportunity of viewing some very beautiful pictures of the scenery along the line of the Intercolonial Railway. It is the custom at the Bulletin displays to entertain the crowd, during the period between bulletins, with a series of pleasing and instructive views, the New York Herald management never permitting anything in the nature of low comedy, or any direct advertising. On this occasion the operator decided upon the Intercolonial pictures which had been gladly furnished at his request. Twenty-four views were flashed upon the screens, these being selected from every portion of the line. In a letter thanking the I. C. R. authorities for the use of the slides, the operator observes that the pictures proved most interesting, and were viewed by no less than 50,000 people.

FARMERS' COLUMN. AT THE OPERA HOUSE

SUBURBAN FLOCKS

The number of fowls raised in cities, towns and villages cannot be estimated. They run up into the millions of dollars' worth. It demonstrates, however, the fact that all kinds and classes of people find profit and pleasure in poultry. A small number of hens will fill the egg basket and with a little care and the table scraps—will keep up their contribution until they begin to moult in the fall. When the space for poultry is limited the chicks should be marketed early or used on the family table and the early hatched pullets be retained to take the place of the hens in the fall and winter. The young cockerels should be sold early. To retain them is to incur an expense on the hens, for they have to lay eggs and bring in the money when the cockerels and drones do nothing but eat. See that they attain a good weight and dispose of them right away.

EXERCISE

During the winter, when snow lies on the ground any considerable length of time, covering up a large proportion of nature's food, different methods are necessary if eggs are to be secured. In the first place the exercise which the fowls get in roaming over the fields will have to be provided in another way. Exercise is just as necessary as the food. Access to a straw stack will keep the hens busy scratching for the stray kernel. A pile of clean straw on the floor of the poultry house or in an open shed will be an incentive for exercise if the grain is scattered in it. It is not necessary nor desirable to keep the hens shut up in close quarters just to keep them from getting in the snow. The eating of sugar is not detrimental to fowls.

A WORLD POWER

Speaking of the establishment of its bureau at Ottawa, the New York Herald makes this reference to "Our Good Neighbours on the North":
"With a land area greater than that of the United States—excluding Alaska and Hawaii—a representative government and an ingenious and enterprising population that is rapidly increasing from natural growth and immigration, Canada is destined to become a world power. First among American newspapers to recognize the present influence and future potentiality of the Dominion, the Herald has established a permanent news service at Ottawa. A special and trusted correspondent of this newspaper has become a member of the press corps at the Canadian Capital, and will keep our readers and the American public advised of every tinge of legislative interest that affects the people of the Dominion—and which necessarily, therefore, affects the people of the United States."

After quoting appreciative comments of Canadian papers, the Herald says: "A great, free and growing people like the Canadians, with a truly imperial domain within which to expand, are destined within a short time to wield a world wide influence, and the Herald is glad to become their chronicler, interpreter and prophet."

His Grace Archbishop Bruchési, in view of the present month being the time for presenting petitions for hotel licenses in Montreal, has instructed his clergy to urge their parishioners to sign only petitions against such licenses. His Grace also asks his clergy to help in every possible way the praiseworthy initiative of the temperance committee of the National Federation of Women. 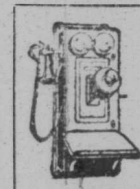
