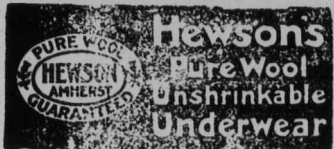

In him the poor had a friend in deed and in word. "One can do anything," he once said to me, "for God's poor, and the victims of unhappy circumstances." The many nameless unremembered acts of this able man have made life brighter for the sick and weak and poor. He died in Florida whither he had gone in search of health.—Presbyterian Review.
