### WHERE ARE THEY DRIFTING?

is Crerar's National Progressive  
Party" which, apparently, is to remain  
a purely North-West sectional phan-  
tasm. It is all off with Drury and Cr-  
erar, possibly on account of the Back-  
us deal and the Provincial Rights hum-  
bug.

### CAPITAL AND POPULATION CANADA'S GREATEST NEEDS

An exceedingly strong reason  
why we should maintain a stable  
government in Canada is that the  
burden of taxation is too heavy for a  
young nation to bear and should be  
minimized as quickly as possible. One  
of the best ways to bring about a re-  
duction is to increase the population  
and thereby minimize the per head  
load of taxes. Enlarged population of  
course means necessity for increased  
capital to assimilate it. If sensible  
policies are continued there is little  
difficulty about getting population.  
Every ship leaving the Old Country  
for months has been loaded with peo-  
ple from the Mother Country anxious  
to make new homes for themselves  
in this new country, and there has  
been a great influx of people from  
the United States into our Western  
country. The biggest difficulty is to  
get additional capital from outside.  
And the question then is—how best  
can we attract outside capital? Can  
we do it if we have a country distract-  
ed politically, with class striving  
against class? No, assuredly not!  
Capital always shies away from con-  
ditions of that kind; always steers  
clear of countries where political con-  
ditions are unstable. It requires as  
an essential a sane, sensible govern-  
ment, representative, of all classes  
under which reasonable security of  
fair and decent treatment is assured.

No country ever had a greater  
opportunity than Canada to make  
wonderful progress. The cards are  
all in our hands if we only play  
them right. If we only keep our  
heads we will have a large flow  
of population and capital from  
other countries. The war has changed  
the life outlook and perspective of  
millions of peoples of the Old Lands,  
and nowhere better than in Canada  
can they find scope for their energies  
and activities.

The financiers of the world are  
just beginning to realize the tre-  
mendous extent of our natural re-  
sources, and the splendid advan-

ages we have for manufacturing  
development by reason of our mag-  
nificent water powers; and, unless  
checked by immature statesmanship  
we should see a great development of  
Canada, which will be of untold ben-  
efit to the whole people. All we have  
to do is to keep steady and to be  
sane in our politics. We should not  
let the extremists and class agitators  
carry us away with their half-baked,  
half-digested theories. In those trou-  
blesome times, with such a splendid  
prospect ahead of us, we should cling  
fast to that which we know, cling  
fast to sane, orderly, stable govern-  
ment for all classes, a Government  
based upon the best Anglo-Saxon prac-  
tice, and not allow ourselves to get  
tangled up in class consciousness,  
with selfishness as their motive, which  
can only lead to chaos, if not disaster.

## WAPTA LAKE CAMP.

About eight miles west of Lake Louise Station on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway just before entering the Kicking Horse Canyon, the traveller notices a very beautiful sheet of water named Wapta Lake, sheltered from the north by a high and massive mountain capped by eternal snow.

On the shores of this lake, facing a magnificent Alpine panorama, a rustic bungalow Camp has been constructed, which opened for visitors on July 1st, and will provide a comfortable and convenient centre for those who desire to explore one of the most romantic and picturesque districts in the Canadian Pacific Rockies. The Lake itself is at an elevation of 5,190 feet above sea level, and faces peaks scaling up to over 11,000 feet. It is only half a day's walk from Lake O'Hara, which has been selected as the site of the Annual Camp of the Alpine Club of Canada for 1921. Lake O'Hara, however, is more than a centre for Alpine climbers. It was selected by John S. Sargent, the famous artist, as one of the most beautiful places he could find in the Rockies, surrounded as it is with mountains of wild and rugged grandeur which at the same time compose into pictures of unending beauty.

Wapta Lake is actually in British Columbia just over the Great Divide, which will undoubtedly be a favorite trip from the Camp. Ten minutes walk to the west of the Camp the Kicking Horse Canyon begins, down which one can walk, ride or drive. From the west end of Wapta Lake to Field is less than twelve miles, and the distance to Yoho Falls in

the Yoho Valley is ten miles, and to Emerald Lake is fourteen miles. To-  
wards the north, one can reach Sher-  
brooke and Ross Lakes in about an  
hour and a half, so that the variety  
of excursions offered to those who  
stay at this Camp is remarkable.

Wapta Lake Camp is constructed  
on the same lines as the Lake  
Windermere Camp, which proved so  
popular last summer. It has a Cen-  
tral Community House for dancing  
and recreation purposes 80 feet  
square with a wide gallery round the  
sides. The kitchen is a large build-  
ing, 20 x 26 ft, while the cottages  
are of varying sizes and design—  
double cottages being 24 x 14 ft. and  
single cottages 14 x 12 ft. Each cot-  
tage is equipped with a small heater  
and stove pipe on account of the cool  
nights natural to this elevation. The  
Camp is within the jurisdiction of  
the Dominion Parks Authorities, and  
subject to the Dominion Parks regu-  
lations, which are particular in  
guarding against forest fires, pre-  
vent the cutting down of green tim-  
ber in the vicinity of the Camp and  
forbid any dealing in liquor on the  
premises. The Camp occupies an  
area of three acres, and the rustic  
bungalow character of the Camp  
gives it a very attractive appearance.

About 50 visitors can be accommo-  
dated at one time. Two bath houses,  
one for men and one for ladies, are  
supplied with hot and cold running  
water and toilet facilities.  
Hector is the Station for Wapta  
Lake Camp and for the convenience  
of visitors a motor launch will con-  
nect with a landing stage in front  
of the Camp. Transfer charge from  
Station to Camp is 25 cents each  
way. Saddle horses and guides will  
be available for those who wish to  
ride, and telephone connection with  
Chateau Lake Louise will make it  
easy to communicate with those who  
have engaged any of the Company's  
Swiss Guides. These guides are in  
great demand, and their services  
should be requisitioned well in ad-  
vance.

One of the most thrilling trips in  
the whole Canadian Pacific Rockies  
can be made from Wapta Lake  
Camp. This is by way of Lake  
Louise over the Victoria Glacier to  
Abbott Pass under the great precip-  
ices of Lefroy. After the summit  
of this Pass one reaches Lake Oesa,  
from which one gets an exquisite  
view of Lake O'Hara down below.

From Lake O'Hara an easy trail  
down Cataract Creek brings one back  
to Wapta Lake. This, of course, is  
a somewhat strenuous trip and re-  
quires Swiss Guides.  
An easier trip on saddle ponies  
through magnificent Alpine scenery  
is through the Yoho Valley to Emer-  
ald Lake or over the Burgess Pass to  
Field. A four-in-hand Tally-ho will  
drive down the Kicking Horse Pass  
on a road which follows the old  
C. P. R. grade.

The rates for Wapta Lake Camp  
are very moderate, being \$5.50 per  
day for those who can make only a  
short stay, and \$5.00 for those who  
can stay a week or more.

The C. P. R. passenger trains will  
stop at Hector while the Camp is in  
operation, with the exception of  
trains Nos. 2, 7 and 8.

The Camp will be operated by  
Colonel Phil Moore and Mrs. Moore.
