United States Dollar At Discount

TORONTO, Nov. 23.—Canadianians who receive checks or other paper drawn upon banks or other financial institutions in the United States must pay Canadian banks one-quarter of one per cent for converting the same into Canadian money. Announcement to this effect was made yesterday and it was not unexpected, as for a number of weeks the United States dollar has been at a discount of from 1-16 to 1-8 per cent. At one time in the post war period New York funds sold at as high as 19 per cent; and for a long period the rate hung around 14 per cent. Early this year the discount began to melt away steadily.


BETTER LUMBER OUTLOOK NORTH

J.W. Brankley, general manager of the Miramichi Lumber Company for New Brunswick and Maine, with headquarters at Chatham, was in St. John, last week. Speaking to a reporter Mr. Brankley said that the prospects for a good lumber cut along the Miramichi during the coming winter were exceptionally bright. A great deal of the old cut has been cleared up during the summer, as the shipping was very satisfactory. He said that the Miramichi Lumber Company's cut this year would amount to 20,000,000 feet and that Fraser Companies Ltd; intended to cut in the vicinity of 25,000,000 feet. The cut of the smaller firms will be considerably less, ranging from 4,000,000 to 7,000,000 or 8,000,000. In all the cut would be about two-thirds of the normal. Trade conditions along the Miramichi are improving and it is thought that by spring they will have returned to normal.

British House to Take Up Irish Constitution Bill

London, Nov. 22.—It is now definitely arranged that the Debate on the address will be interrupted in order to allow the speed passage of the Irish constitution bill. The debate on the address begins tomorrow and will be continued on Friday. It will then be carried over until Thursday of next week. The three intervening days will thus be given for the passage of the Irish bill through the House of Commons.

HOME for Christmas — to many thousands of Britishers now living in various parts of Canada that is more than a thought, it is a sentiment. Christmas probably means more to English people than to most others, while to the Scotch, New Year's Day is the Day of Days. For both of them the holiday season brings a heart pull towards the Old Country that will not be denied, and to many of those who will not admit the touch of human nature that makes us all kin, the holiday season comes as an excellent opportunity, and something of an excuse to make a trip back "Home." For Christmas week old London draws all the world. The fascinating splendour and incomparable facilities of entertainment are at their best, and like April in the English countryside, it sets all who know her longing to be there. "It is already apparent that the holiday travel to Europe will this year be rather heavier than it has for some time, which may perhaps be taken as one result of the more generally satisfactory crop year through which

the country has passed. Then, too, conditions in Great Britain are somewhat better stabilized than they have been, and the welcome home will probably be all the heartier. The Canadian Pacific Railway has made special arrangements to meet the expected increase in traffic. Trains carrying passengers will run alongside the ships at St. John, N.B., thus guaranteeing a practically uninterrupted journey from any point in Canada to the British port. A feature of the trans-Atlantic holiday travel this year will be the employment of the new Canadian Pacific Mono-class steamers. Technically these steamers provide second-class and steerage accommodation, but their appointments and service are such as to make them adequate for almost any standard of taste. The "Montcalm," which will be included in the holiday sailings, is typical of that class. She is an oil-burner of a total length of 563 feet, with the utmost in spacious and luxurious accommodation. In the short time in which she has been running, she has proved comfortable to the last de-

gree, and her fittings include a cellular double bottom and the very latest and most perfect operating safety devices. Lounges, drawing, card and smoking rooms and dining saloon are the last word in modern interior decoration, with first thoughts given to comfort and good taste. A special Children's Room is a new feature, and the steerage, or third class, accommodation is of the most modern description. Here again the lounges, smoking and other rooms, and the dining saloons provide unexcelled comfort and ample space. By way of guaranteeing a thorough service for holiday travellers, the Canadian Pacific will run special tourist sleepers from Edmonton, Calgary, and other Western points. These will connect with special trains at Winnipeg, and will run through to the ship's side. Sailings from St. John are arranged as follows:—"Tunisian" to Glasgow and Liverpool, Dec. 5; "Melita" to Southampton, Dec. 9; "Montcalm" to Liverpool, Dec. 12, and "Metagama" to Glasgow, Dec. 15.
