LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Two negroes and a Chinaman, under sentence of death for murder, are to be hanged at New Westminster B. C. on Friday next.

The Cuban steamer Thomas Brooks arrived at Kingston, Jamaica on the 11th, to convey the adherents of General Firmin to Haiti.

Last Friday evening Miss Sara Bremer of Lunenburg, N. S. aged ninety, was lighting a fire in the stove and her clothes ignited.

Allen Bros. Sakeshop at Keewatin on the 10th, was burned and Andrew Allen, aged 18, was burned to death.

The British House of Commons last Thursday night passed the second reading of the Irish Land Bill.

The explosion of a lighted lamp last Wednesday night, caused the death of Mrs. James Hiley, Rockland Road, St. John N. B. probably by suffocation.

Advice of the 9th, inst., from Fort William Ontario says—All doubt as to the fate of the big steamer Clemon of Duluth, which has not been heard of since a week ago, has been confirmed by the arrival of the steamer Dundee.

A daring diamond robbery was committed at Notre Dame St., Montreal last Friday night. A man smashed the plate glass window in the jewellery store of Turcotte, and ran off with \$2,000 worth of diamonds.

Thos. W. Crozier, of Toronto, pleaded guilty on the 9th on the charge of counterfeiting money, before Judge McCreary and was sentenced to seven years in Kingston penitentiary.

Mr. Sydney Baxton, British Postmaster General replying to a question in the House of Commons the other day, said that the Canadian magazine post instituted last May was fully successful.

Battered by mountainous seas since she left Hamburg three weeks previously for New York, the German steamer Karlsruhe of the Hamburg American Packet Line, worked her way slowly into St. John's, Nfld., on the 10th for the purpose of replenishing her empty coal bunkers.

The clergyman of Glouce Bay met with the Town Council recently to discuss the best means of relieving the distress which exists among a large number of families, owing to the scarcity of work in the coal mines.

More than a score of persons were injured, five seriously, when a bomb was thrown into a tenement house in New York the other day. The house was badly wrecked.

Herl Crewe has announced in the House of Lords that the Imperial Government would introduce a Bill changing the Corporation oath, so that the clause denouncing Catholicism as idolatrous would not be in the oath, but not otherwise changing its Protestant features.

It is beyond doubt that throughout the developments of the recent Balkan crisis, European financiers played no unimportant part in safeguarding peace.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Mrs. Laura Smith and her two year old daughter were burned to death early Sunday by a fire that destroyed the farm built at Brunswick, Vermont.

Mark Wright will start a factory in Newson's Block in January next, for the manufacture of wire spring and stuffed mattresses for the wholesale trade.

Two buildings were wrecked and seven persons were killed and the windows shattered for a block around by the terrific explosion of a bomb in an alley in Wabash Avenue, Chicago, on Monday.

Between thirty thousand and thirty-five thousand deaths and two millions of people injured is the accident record of the States during the past year among workmen, according to a bulletin issued by the Bureau of Labor at Washington.

The crew of the fishing sloop Irene, of Sheephead Bay, put into South Brooklyn, N. Y., Monday, after nine hours continuous rowing in an open boat, and reported the loss of the Irene and their own narrow escape by fire and by water.

May Leclair, aged eleven years, motherless, who kept house for her father in Providence, R. I., attempted to start a fire in the kitchen stove, with kerosene oil. Her dress caught fire and she was burned from head to foot.

A huge tank in the I. C. R. Island yard at St. John N. B. containing 100,000 gallons of water, burst Sunday night, smashing in the windows of the dynamo room of the power plant and of the stores department, carrying away a portion of the bridge across the creek and flooding the immediate vicinity with two feet of water.

The prisoners Shephard and McDonald, awaiting trial for stealing horses, breaking into Tracadie Station, Ross McEwen & Co's shop at St. Peter's, and other crimes, a couple of months ago, escaped from Queen's County Jail on Sunday last, and got up along as far as the vicinity of Morrell before they were recaptured Monday night.

Advices from Munich, bring intelligence of a unique catastrophe. A lady of fashion was walking along the street, wearing the latest style of hat. The gorgeous creation was nearly two feet in diameter, and the lady unequal to the strain of heaving the great weight, sank helplessly to the pavement, and had to be carried into a store before she recovered.

By the overhauling of an engine, two men working on the Grand Trunk Pacific, a short distance west of Moncton, were badly injured yesterday. The engine on a ballast train left the rails and upset. The driver, brakeman and fireman McGan were in the cab at the time. The driver had two ribs fractured, and his shoulder badly injured, while the fireman was badly scalded about the feet, arms and back.

The summer steamers stopped running on the Summerside-Point du Chene route on Thursday last. Since then these steamers have been running between Charlottetown and Picton. The winter steamers have not commenced their regular work yet, but both the Empress and Minto left here for Picton yesterday morning.

The schooner Laura Victoria, 39 tons, loaded with 40 tons of coal for Georgetown, went ashore on Poverty Beach at the entrance of Murray Harbor, early on Saturday morning last. She was commanded by Capt. John Hemphill, of Georgetown.


