THE EMPEROR OF CHINA DEAD

His Three-year-old Nephew is Placed on Throne—Dowager Empress Now in Control.

Washington, Nov. 13.—A brief cablegram to the State Department from Minister Rockhill, at Peking, announces the death of the Emperor of China this morning. No details are given.

The late Emperor was 36 years old and his health had long been a matter of grave concern to the empire. She ruled absolutely during the early years of the late Emperor's life, and when, backed by the Reform party, he asserted himself, she is supposed to have instigated the Boxer troubles, which resulted in power returning to her hands.

8 RIDES FOR 25 CENTS Mayor-Elect Braithmeyer of Detroit Declares his Minimum Demand.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 12.—Mayor-elect Braithmeyer, yesterday declared his position on the traction question. Under a recently adopted regulation any franchise proposition has to be submitted to a vote of the electors of Detroit before it can be legally adopted by the city.

It will not submit to the people any proposition that does not include a provision that the rate of fare shall not exceed eight tickets for twenty-five cents, good day and night, with free university transfers.

Mr. Braithmeyer has been quoted in one Montreal newspaper as saying that if elected he would secure three-cent fares inside of three months. This statement, like similar ones attributed to Mayor Thompson, are supposed to have a foundation in fact.

Top Poor to Press Claim. Minneapolis, Nov. 12.—While W. P. Griffith is working for union wages in the Northwest Carriage Works, an estate valued at several thousand dollars is supposed to be waiting for him in Wales, near the town of Brynawr.

Washington, Nov. 12.—A deficit in the governmental postal service for the year which ended June 30th, 1908, of seventeen millions, was announced today by Postmaster General Meyer.

Chinese Editor Guilty of Libel. Shanghai, Nov. 13.—Editor O'Shea of the North China Gazette, charged with criminal libel, was found guilty today and sentenced to two months imprisonment.

Earthquakes in Belgium. Spa, Belgium, Nov. 12.—A violent earthquake of three seconds duration, occurred here at nine thirty this morning.

Settlement in Timber Limit Suit. Ottawa, Nov. 12.—A settlement has been reached in the suit of W. J. Fraser, of Ottawa, for an interest in certain timber limits.

Failed to Save Fellow Workman. Campbellton, Nov. 4.—Baptist Duke aged 22 of Kempf, Que., was killed here today.

Premier is Unwell. Ottawa, Nov. 11.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is suffering from a bad cold in consequence of which the cabinet did not meet this afternoon.

Brakeman Cut in Two. Orlino, Nov. 12.—John Campbell, Grand Trunk brakeman, was cut in two this morning after slipping under the cars.

ALBERTA FEELS TRADE REVIVAL

Freight Traffic, the Unfailing Business Barometer, Shows Large Increase Recently.

That business generally is improving in Alberta this fall is clearly evidenced by the increase in freight shipments over that of last year.

Brooklyn Theatre Burned. New York, Nov. 12.—The famous Old Park Theatre, facing Broadway, on Fulton street, Brooklyn, was practically destroyed by fire this evening.

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SIX NEW DREAUNAGHTS

London, Nov. 12.—Prime Minister Asquith replying to a question in the House of Commons stated today that the government defined "two-power" standard of naval strength as a preponderance by ten per cent over the combined strength of the ships of the next two strongest powers.

The minister's statement was received with prolonged cheers. This statement is taken to confirm the belief held by naval circles that at least six or perhaps seven additional warships of the Dreadnaught type will be provided for in the next naval estimates.

CARRY CAMPAIGN INTO A CHURCH

Suffragettes Unmindful of Sanctity of Church Edifice, and Stop Birrell's Speech.

London, Nov. 12.—The City Temple Rev. J. R. Campbell's church, is the latest cockpit for the suffragettes. Regardless of the sacred purpose for which the building is designed they raised their familiar clamor for votes, thereby causing the suspension of a quality equal to their noisiest efforts.

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SAVED DANIEL TYLER'S LIFE.

Fred Miller Allowed Himself to be Stripped of Skin.

Minneapolis, Nov. 12.—Through the heroism of Fred Miller, Wheaton, Minn., the life of Daniel Tyler, Williston, North Dakota, who is in the city hospital with one-third of his body denuded of skin as the result of a railway accident, has been saved.

Nose Off and On Again. Chatham, Nov. 12.—Bert, the 8-year-old son of Jas. Hastings, had his nose severed from his face by his playmate accidentally striking him with an axe.

Big Fire in Winnipeg. Winnipeg, Nov. 12.—The plant of the Winnipeg Oil Company is in flames. The fire started at one o'clock this afternoon and is burning yet. It looks like a total loss.
