Industrial Training.

There is a growing dissatisfaction with present school methods and school subjects. Good, bad or indifferent as the school may be in the present times, efficient or inefficient as the school teacher may be, there is a growing feeling that present-day education does not fill the bill in making for good and serviceable citizens. One phase of this dissatisfaction is found in the investigation which is being made in the Dominion of Canada by the Technical Education Commission under the presidency of Dr. Robertson. To some extent the dissatisfaction has found vent during the past quarter of a century by the establishment of science laboratories in schools, manual training in wood and metals, garden work and general nature study. The latest phase in the British Isles is the establishment of a League to promote Industrial Training. Of this, Public Opinion says recently:-

"The new National Industrial Education League, at which Mr. R. Applegarth, a well-known trade unionist, has been working for some time, came into formal being at a meeting in the Guildhall last week, and was blessed by the King, the Premier, Mr. Balfour, and many others.

The object of the League is to urge upon the Government to supplement our present system of elementary education by providing by legislation a complete system of industrial, professional and commercial training.

The Guildhall Conference declared that it viewed with grave concern the large number of children annually leaving school without practical training for definite vocations, and resolves that a national system of industrial, professional, and commercial training should be established, to which the children shall pass as a matter of course (unless the parents are prepared to undertake their future training) and without interval, for a definite period, to be thoroughly trained for entry to the particular calling for which they are best fitted, such training to be under fully qualified instructors. That the Government be urged to provide by legislation such a complete system of training, free to all scholars, and the expenses thereof defrayed from the National Exchequer.

The proposed National Industrial Education League will be composed of 2,500 organised bodies of work-people engaged in trade union, co-operative and educational work, and as far as can be at present ascertained, they represent over three million of workers, comprising 365 trades and professions in 421 cities and towns.

Bible Class Meeting.

There was an unusually large attendance at the Cathedral Men's Bible Class yesterday. Rev. J. Bell introduced Hon. John Harvey and referred to the good work he had done in connection with the A. P. C. Hon. Mr. Harvey then rose and after paying a complimentary reference to the singing, went on to speak of the Health of the Colony and the ravages that were being caused by consumption. The disease was the cause of half the deaths in the Colony and about three persons died of it every day. Since 1901 about 8,000 persons died of it. He strongly condemned the habit of spitting and recommended more attention to cleanliness and pure air and clean homes. Teachers of the schools and the leaders in the church could do a great deal in checking consumption. The greatest Physician was the founder of the Church. He was pleased to see that the Cathedral authorities were considering the advisability of getting a nurse for the parish.

Mr. Bell in thanking Mr. Harvey quoted from the Bishop of London and the Bishop of Birmingham to show that it was the duty of the clergymen to see that the families in their parishes live in healthy surroundings, and that they were filling a part of their mission when they made enquiries to the causes of disease with a view to preventing them. Mr. Bell said he would like to see a "Sanitary Aid and Housing Committee" composed of ladies and gentlemen to act with the City Council.

At the R. C. Cathedral.

Rt. Rev. Monsignor Roche preached at the R. C. Cathedral last night on a text taken from the Gospel read at the Mass, 21 chap. 8 verse: "And a great multitude spread their garments in the way; others cut down branches from the trees, strewed them in the way, crying Hosanna to the Son of David; Blessed is He that cometh in the name of Lord." The rev. preacher described the rigors of the lenten fast in the early days of the Church when the people would go whole days without food or drink during the great week, now known as Holy Week. The Church did not require this now of her children and had adopted the lenten regulations to suit the weaknesses of the people of the age. Monsignor Roche gave a graphic description of the ceremonies and liturgy of Holy Week and showed how the Church portrayed the great closing events in Our Divine Lord's life in a way that enlisted our love and devotion to Our Saviour, viz. the institution of the Blessed Eucharist on Holy Thursday night; the Crucifixion on Good Friday and the Resurrection on Easter Sunday. The triumphant entry into Jerusalem was celebrated on this day—Palm Sunday. The fickleness of the human crowd was shown to the full. The tender heart of Our Lord saw through it all. He saw the ingratitude of the crowd in a few days more and the calling out for his death. He saw the hardness of heart of those people, their great chance lost and their beautiful city destroyed. He shed tears at the contemplation of what was in store for those people who would so soon forget all his miracles and all his acts of kindness. They were the types of inconsistency. In conclusion the Monsignor brought the reason home to the congregation. He cautioned them to be true to Jesus Christ even to the death on the cross. To lead good, straight, honest and upright lives, to love God and their neighbour, and above all during the closing days of Lent to approach the Sacraments of Penance and Communion and be restored to the love and friendship of God.

SAYS MR. JOB.

Men belonging to the Beothic who came over this morning from the South Side say that the crew of the ship refuse to sell their share of the cargo of fat for the current price \$4.50 for young hares and young hoods. They say that they want \$5.00 per lb. for the seals and give as a reason for the demand for a raise that the price of seal oil has considerably advanced in the foreign market. Some of those who came over on this side to-day say that they will cut up and throw overboard their share sooner than sell them at the current rate. As far as Mr. Job is aware there is no trouble over the fat. He was not approached in any formal way over the matter and says that this forenoon he sent on board the ship, told the men of the price being given and that as far as he is aware no protest was made nor was an advance asked for. The Beothic is not discharging her seals owing to the storm.
