MEXICO CITY, May 11.
Members of the Diplomatic Corps residing in Mexico City, met to-day upon invitation at the American Embassy to plan concerted action for the protection of aliens in the event of the situation at the capital reaching a stage that would necessitate taking measures to defend themselves. Later the American Ambassador called on the Mexican Minister of Foreign Affairs to lay before him the movement contemplated on the part of the representatives of Foreign Governments who are stationed here. The details have not been made public.

WASHINGTON, May 11.
Country and City were arrayed against each other to-day at the Reciprocity hearing before the Senate Committee, and the conflict was sharp. Farmers from Minnesota and North Dakota, denounced the agreement as a hitherto, whilst members of the Boards of Trade from cities along the international boundary endorsed it. The Cityites were headed by a delegation wearing badges a foot long inscribed "One hundred per cent strong for Reciprocity Buffalo."
